

U. S. Ship Warren

Monterey, December 28th. 1848.

Dear Macomby,

I have this moment received your kind letter of the 21st. and send you many thanks for it. The news from the United States in relation to the departure of the Steamers for this station was received with a great deal of pleasure by all of us here, as up to the receipt of your Letter all that had reached us in relation to them was mere rumour - I was not quite as much pleased at the news regarding the probable result of the election, and still hope for better things. Tell the Purser that I am inexpressibly obliged to him for his kind offer to use his influence to secure for me the St. Mary's, and that as our good turn deserves another I will entreat the Commodore, with tears in my eyes, to allow him to come on board the Warren when she shall be laid up at the Islands as a Store Ship! I know that it is as best that he will be pleased with, and no doubt, he can effect an exchange with our purser! Tell him that I will take his letters home for him in the Ohio - with great pleasure I am sorry to hear of the difficulties on board the St. M. I hope Captain will come off best, although I am ignorant of the merits of the case.

I have written to you and Boz twice since you  
left here, one <sup>letter</sup> by the St. Mary's (which you have re-  
ceived) and one since in reply to yours of the 30th  
of last month, the one you gave Woodworth. He  
sent it down by another <sup>you</sup> person. In case you did  
not receive my last, (or whether <sup>you</sup> have or not) let me  
again thank you for having procured this gold for  
me. I think that you got it on very reasonable terms,  
cheaper indeed than I thought you would be able to  
do from the reports which we had received here of the  
great and increasing demand for this article. I  
most thankfully accept your kind offer to dispose  
of it at Mayallan, in order that I may reinvest its  
ups here, on the return of the Ohio. I should have  
asked you to make this same disposition, if that  
you did as yours, when I wrote last, had I known  
at that time that you were going to Mayallan.  
I will not apologize for giving you the trouble,  
but accept the kind offer which you have made  
as frankly as it was made, knowing that under  
similar circumstances you would call upon me  
and that you would do so with the conviction that  
it would give me pleasure to oblige you. Since I  
have commenced this I have heard that there is a  
little bug to read here for Sun. Bles early in the  
morning (it is now 1/2 past 9 P.M.) and on second  
thoughts I think that I will send this Letter by her in  
the hope that it may reach you at Mayallan — Ma.  
say on board that the Ohio must almost beyond

all doubt, have left San Francisco long before  
this time. Major Hall goes as far as San Pedro in  
~~the~~<sup>bus</sup> (on his way to Los Angeles) and I will get him  
to forward my Letter of ~~this~~ <sup>the</sup> ~~Day~~ is determined at St. Pedro  
We have nothing more here. Alvin Buchanan  
of Hall, owing to be remembered to you. Tell ~~Bob~~  
that I intended to have written to him when I  
commenced this, but as ~~he~~ <sup>would never go to</sup> go to Mazatlan ~~was~~  
-~~then~~ to meet the Ohio, that "I have not time  
left to find another to night, & the vessel leaves early  
in the morning - Tell him to write & do so yourself.  
Remember me to all your friends  
Believe me to be sincerely
