

The datestamp on this postal card showed desired routing through Hamburg. The 1874 Treaty permitted postal cards to be exchanged between the two countries if fully paid 2¢ or 10 centimes. U.S. Postal Guides permitted addition of a 1¢ adhesive to a U.S. postal card. Here a 1¢ 1873 Continental Bank Note Company adhesive (Scott No. 156) has been added to an 1873 postal card, Scott No. UX3.
