
Running Messenger Designs 1885 - 1902

The U.P.U. approved a special service to speedily deliver mail for an extra fee in 1885. The U.S. issued the first special service stamp on October 1, 1885, naming the service 'Special Delivery' with only 555 first class post offices providing the service. On October 1, 1886 service was extended to all post offices. No formal service exchange agreements with foreign countries existed until 1923. The U.S. and Canada had an informal agreement beginning in 1896.

The design incorporated a running messenger with a text inscription describing the immediate delivery service. In 1888, the text tablet changed to "at any office". In February, 1893 the stamp's color switched to orange to lessen any confusion with the one cent Columbian Exhibition value. The color reverted to blue in 1894.

This exhibit includes forerunner examples and continues in a traditional fashion presenting U.S. Special Delivery issues from 1885 until 1902 when delivery by bicycle became the norm and the design was revised. The American Banknote Co. printed the first three issues, the Bureau of Engraving and Printing printed the remainder. The rate, without weight limit, remained at 10¢ during this entire period.

Essays, proofs, stamps, local, domestic and territorial usages are followed by foreign destinations and origins. Rarities are specially matted with dark blue borders.

Postal Markings

The Special Delivery service did not require a special device to cancel stamps. Manuscript, hand daters, targets and fancy killer devices were used by post offices.



Service Regulations

Special Delivery letters mailed without first class postage prepaid were to be 'Held for Postage' according to post office regulations until January 16, 1889, when the regulation was corrected.



Sacramento to San Jose, Ca., April 29, 1886 'Held for Postage' marking applied April 29, 10AM; postage paid and letter forwarded April 30, 5PM



New York, N.Y. to Cleveland, Oh., February 23, 1886 Marked 'DUE 2 CENTS, N.Y.' postage due, paid in New York and letter forwarded

Service Regulations

Post Office markings for Special Delivery mail include: Postmark of the post office of origin with town name, date and time; Backstamp of the receiving office with town name, date and time of receipt; Serial number used for accounting purposes.

Service Regulations

Serial numbers could be applied to the face of a letter in manuscript or printed form.



Oroville to San Francisco, Ca., Nov. 21, 1885 Special Delivery tracking number 3925 applied in San Francisco by machine

Receiving marks include hand daters as well as special 'Clock' cancellation devices used in various cities. San Francisco was the first city to use the 'Clock' device.
