### The Columbian Exposition Issue

To celebrate the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America, the post office introduced the first commemorative stamp issue, including a value for Special Delivery service. As the color of the new 1¢ value was blue, similar to previous special delivery stamps, the color of the new special delivery issue was changed to orange.



### **Non-delivery Carrier Notices**

Regulations dictated the service offered one attempt at immediate delivery. If the letter was not delivered at that time, it was entered into the normal mail stream.


