We have now to our address, Messrs Alexander, Regular and May; all at the same time.

The cargo of the Regular is mostly woolens. We have sold all the Tin plates at \$11 1/2 box to Manchester, all the Norwich Camblets to Saogue @ 30 1/2¢; they paying import duties; and 100 pounds of Stock Fish at \$14, we paying duties; for the balance we expect to obtain 7 to 12¢. Cloths and Long Elle have now no demand here they find they would not command the lowest prices of last season. Cotton Goods of
