## Winder's Famous (Devilish) Order.

HEADQUARTERS MILITARY PRISON,  
Andersonville, Ga., July 27, 1864.

The officers on duty and in charge of the battery of Florida Artillery at the time, will upon receiving notice that the enemy has approached within seven miles of this post, **OPEN UPON THE STOCKADE WITH GRAPE SHOT**, without reference to the situation beyond these lines of defence.

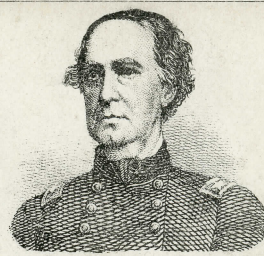

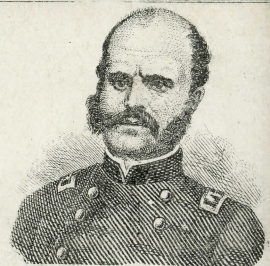

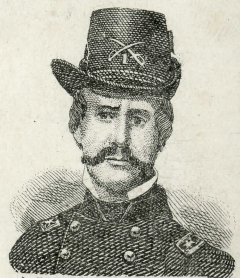

Small envelope which had been affixed to a parcel  
with thread....probably sent from Washington, D.C. The  
postage affixed totaled 17¢ and cancelled with target  
killers. There is a manuscript due marking of .86 cents.

Parcel addressed to: Mrs. Orinda Hitchcock,  
Lapeer, Lapeer County, Michigan.

Manuscript note written on the back of the small envelope  
advises: "Charles was killed on the morning of 19th of  
June while on the skirmish line. He was shot in the head.  
He is buried about 3/4 mile from Petersburg, Va."..

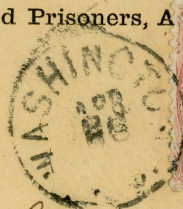

The inspiring examples of other Cities—Chicago, Boston, Cincinnati—should excite among us an honorable emulation. 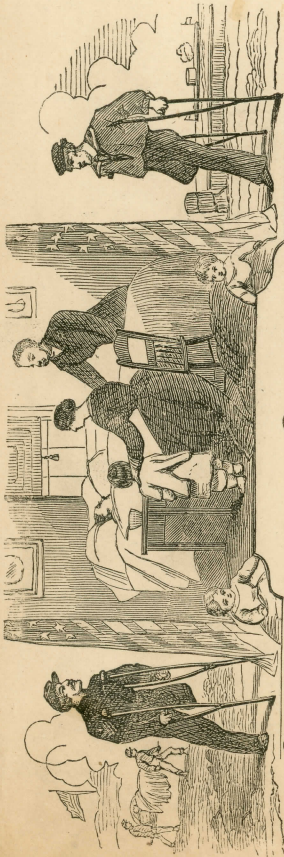
Brooklyn and Long Island Sanitary Fair
