

Bartlet Converse, Richmond, Va; file fold at right crosses stamp and some paper folds sensibly reinforced with archival tape, Scarce Tennessee use. \$250.





Inv-6507 CSA #1, 5¢ green tied by BONSACKS/VA cds prisitne cover addressed to "Miss Fannie Wildman, Lynchburg, Virginia." Scarce Roanoke County town." \$350.



16940 CSA 1, 5¢ green, manuscript canceled with NEWBERRY C.H. / S.C. // MAR / 22 [1862] RED double-circle datestamp on clean cover to Harrington Pope, Pittsboro, No. Ca., on exploded TURNED COVER, inside use professionally silked and flap tear repaired and reattached. Canceled neat PITTSBORO / N.C. // JAN / 15 [1862] with matching PAID 5 (CSA catalog type B, CV \$200) to Hon. J. B. O'Neall, Newberry, S.C. Ex Wayman.



16894 CSA 1-1-v8, 5¢ green WHITE SHIRT VARIETY, ACID FLAW AND SHORT TRANSFER at bottom (sheet margin) tied by indistinct postmark on homemade cover to Mrs. William King, Care Col. Aug. Leftwich, Lynchburg, Virginia. Augustine Leftwich (1794-1881) was a veteran of the War of 1812. His son, Alexander H., was a student at VMI when the war broken out and served in the 8th C.S. Battalion. Ex Gallagher and Katz. \$225.




13731 CSA 1, 5¢ green (faulty) used with MOUNT CRAWFORD CROSSROADS CANCEL, CSA Catalog type AC-09 with CV of \$800, on well-worn and soiled cover with one stamp missing, matching Mount Crawford / Va // Jan / 26 [1862] cds at opposite corner; addressed to "Mister James Mik Foley Care of Capt Cap_Compy I, Mustian 33 Redgmt, First Virga Brigade, Compy T Stone wall Jacksonns Firt Brigade" with "creative" spelling – James M. Foley was a MUSICIAN who enlisted from Harrisonburg (Mt. Crawford in that area) on 6-22-61. He was surrendered with the 5th VA Infantry at Appomattox. Miliatry records included. 2014 CSA Authentication Service certificate 05878, Ex Werner and Robertson. Rare. \$250.

Inv-6872 **CSA #3, 2¢ green** tied **CHARLESTON / S.C.** / JAN / 20 / 186(3) cds on folded business letter, drop use, on blue clipped lined double fold buyer; speaks of buying textiles, raw cotton and expectations of a government rise in prices from Adam to Arch Johnston if Messrs Johnston Cross & Co., Charleston. File fold thru top of stamp otherwise Fine. 2009 SCV \$2,750. \$1,850.



16857 **CSA 1, 5¢ green top sheet margin pair,** roughly separated, tied neat bold **MOBILE / ALA //** APR / 17 / 1862 dcds on cover to Mrs. **Capt. Jas. Courtney,** Kinsale P.O., Westmoreland Co, Virginia. Ex Katz. SCV \$500. \$325.





16011 CSA 4-2, 5¢ blue, Stone 2, Position 32 (plated by another, not verified by me) tied neat DOUBLE-LINE CIRCLE cancel of RICE'S DEPOT / Va. // MAR / 20 [1862] on homemade cover to J. W. C. Wingo, Jetersville, Amelia Co, Va.; sealed with red wax, bit rumpled but scarce marking. In 1860 census, John W. C. Wingo is listed as a 39-year-old farmer and is on list of US Postmaster Appointments 29 Sept 1860 as postmaster of Jetersville as a 39-year-old replaced him for the Confederate POD July 1, 1861, so Wingo may have had Union leanings. \$350.



11169 CSA #5, 10¢ rose bottom imprint single (slight gum toning) tied by partial RICH[MON]D / Va. // JUL / 13 / 1862 cds on cover to Mrs. F. H. Gower, Gainesville, Hall County, Geo; slightly reduced at right, tiny tear at top; 2000 CSA Certificate #03886. Quite scarce.



16351 CSA 5, 10¢ rose (3 ½ margins, light gum stains) tied bold clear OKOLONA / Miss. // JUN / 18 cds on commercially made cover of laid paper, light cover stains, addressed to Hon. Hugh R. Miller, Pontotoc, Mississippi. SCV \$800. Plantation Collection.



11294 CSA #7, 5¢ blue pair (small faults) used with large bold clear balloon postmark of BOUTETOURT SPRINGS / Va. / MAR / 21 on small cover with intact black edged mourning flaps, addressed to Miss Mattie Henson, Charlottesville, Albemarle Co., Va. with 4-page original letter on small emboss crested stationery enclosed headed Hollins Institute, March 17th / 64 from Kate Eastham regarding her arrival, meeting all the girls, her subjects, etc.



Inv-5717 CSA #6, 5¢ blue vertical pair tied neat SALISBURY/N.C. OCT cds to "William S. Pettigrew, Haymo...., Chatham County, NC", crossed out and forwarded to Raleigh with manuscript "Due 10". A wonderful forwarded cover from one of the great Southern families. \$475.

William S. Pettigrew was a brother of CSA General James Johnston Pettigrew, who died a heroic death in 1863. In the immediate aftermath of the Civil War, the Pettigrew family returned to the swamps to wage a futile battle to resurrect their ante-bellum way of life. William attempted to lure former slaves back to the land as day laborers. Letters throughout this period, housed now at UNC-Chapel Hill, reflect his increasing disenchantment with farming. Around 1867, he decided to become an Episcopal priest and transferred business responsibilities to others.



Inv-8755 **CSA #8, 2¢ pale red** (small faults) tied **RICHMOND / VA /** NOV / 18 cds on cover to A. C. Brock, Esq., Clerk, Richmond, **drop use**, slightly reduced at R, ex Malpass, 2010 SCV \$1,500. \$900.

16155 CSA 11-ADa, 10¢ milky blue (4 margins to rounded corner at UR) tied neat STAUNTON / Va // MAY / 10 [1863] cds on fresh homemade cover to Mrs. Norgrove, Lexington, Va. with "Telegram" at top which undoubtedly bore the bad news that her 19 year-old son, Edward W. Norgrove, had been died of wounds on May 8, received at Chancellorsville on May 3. He was in Co. H. VA 27th Infantry, Stonewall Jackson's Brigade, Jackson's/Johnson's Division, 2nd Corps, Army of Northern Virginia. This sad news was posted the same day that Stonewall Jackson died. Edward is buried in Stonewall Jackson Cemetery, Lexington. Ex Cox. \$325.



S.C. // AUG / 31 / 186_ cds on refolded (to eliminate worn edges) larger legal size cover to Stephen Thomas, Box 219, Columbia, SoCa; contents docketing at right end "Annual Statements Aug 31st 1864" which has been crossed out in favor of "Sundries." Inv-10139 Buckingham Female Collegiate Institute all-over green illustrated college cover to Mr. Wm. C. Agee, Gravel Hill, Buckingham [Co] Va, stamp missing at upper right; original enclosure headed "Howards Grove Jan 19th / 62" (Howard's Grove was part of Richmond) from C. R. Fontaine asking that various items be sent to him such as a new pair of boots, standing collars and "better paper and envelopes. You may think I had as well get these in Richmond. I would, but they are very high and the envelopes made now in the South are very indefinent." Ex Hall and Morgan. \$600.



16304 CSA 12c, 10¢ greenish blue (tiny faults) tied light strike of BRISTOL / V.& T.R.R dateless circle railroad datestamp (CCV \$750) on cover to M. H. Brooks Esq, Augusta, Georgia. Penciled "P.S." on back of cover saying all are well but in anxious suspense. Plantation Collection. \$300.



15252 CSA 11c, 10¢ greenish blue bottom sheet margin tied CHATTANOOGA / Ten. // NOV / 17 [1863]
"roving" Army of Tennessee field cancel only used between September 8, 1863, and January 23, 1864, in this manner. Postmaster Harvey T. Phillips (former postmaster of Chattanooga) became the unofficial postmaster of the Army of Tennessee and used the Chattanooga canceling device on his own initiative. He operated from a railroad car behind Confederate lines, nearby and simultaneously with the civilian post office in Chickamauga, Tennessee. Lovely use of this roving military postmark.
