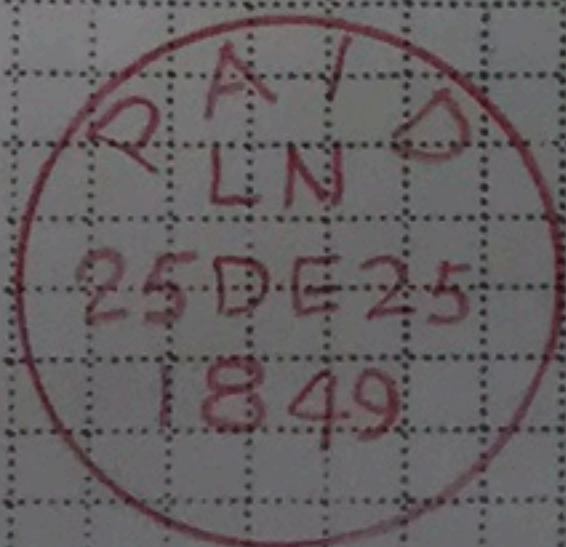

My Dear Brother

I do not know whether you or I wrote last. But it is no matter I want to write to you once I seize upon a leisure moment to devote to you to Birmingham and to England. It is about the very time ^{of year} that such & week I left your kind and hospitable home on Camden Hill and wended my way to Baptryham in Lincolnshire. May many blessings descend upon you and yours in reward for all your acts of sympathy and affection.

But to proceed to the letter. You like Lord Byron awoke on one morning lately and found yourself famous. You are already on the tongues of millions. First came a brief notice stating the fact that the Rev D Holy of Birmingham had been sent away from Denmark. Then a longer paragraph stating more fully the reason of this expulsion of so revered a Gentleman. By and by the whole circumstances are exhibited in detail, the correspondence of the Rev D with his Emulation Sir M. W. W. Wynne (I am not sure that after all I have got Ws enough.) followed by an explosion of republican demagogue and liberal horror at this violation of the rights of a British subject, a Christian & a Baptist. 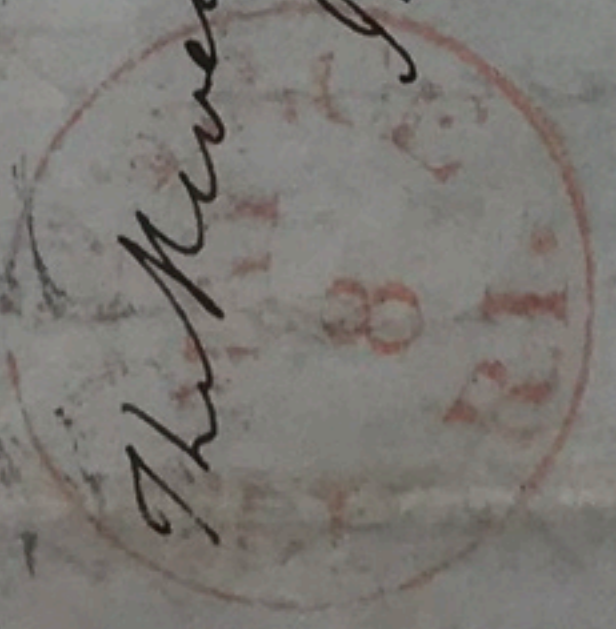
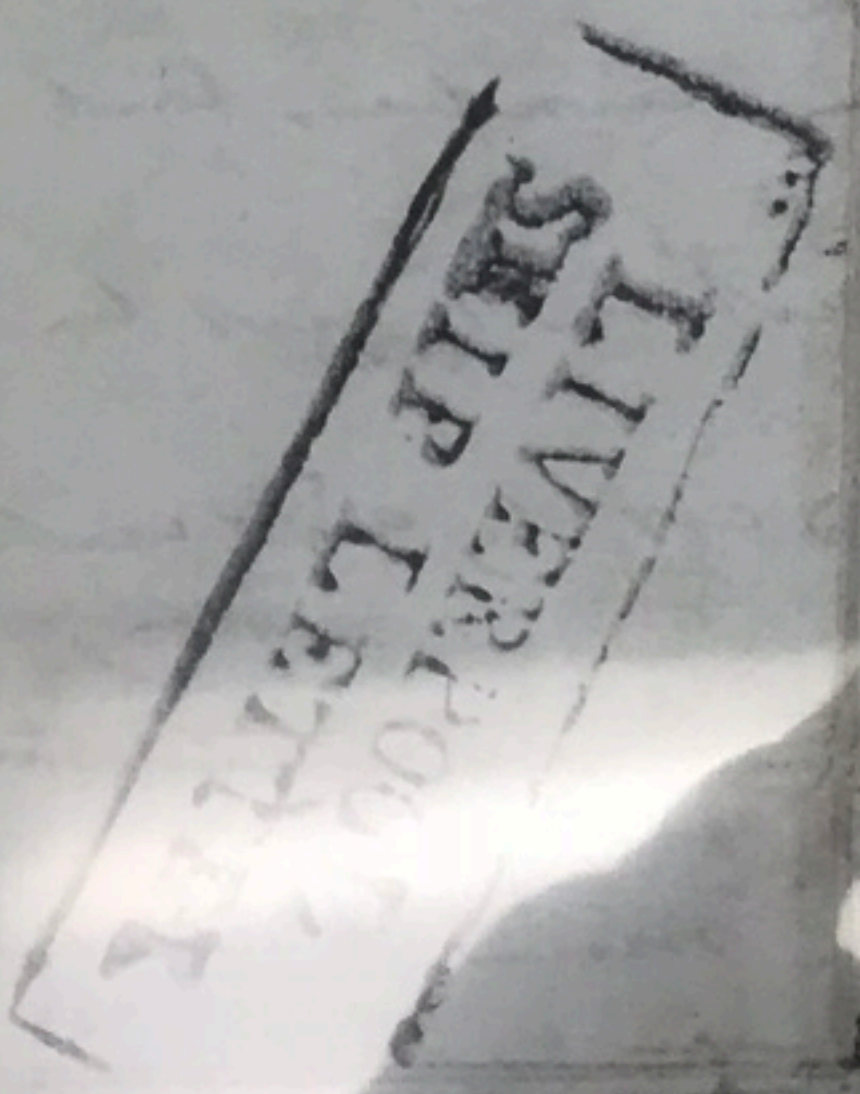

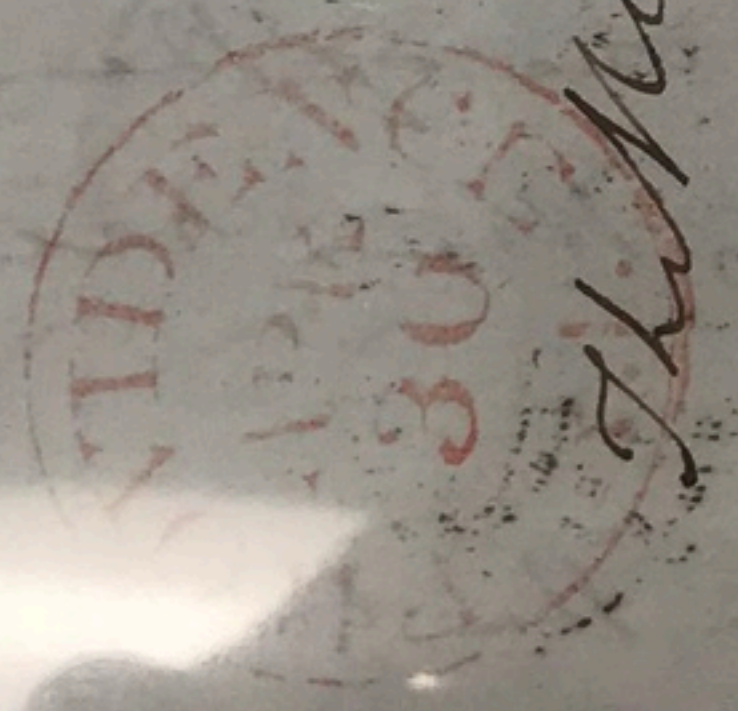
Your letter of Sep 24. is before

Providence April 28. 1851

My Dear Friend

It is now almost three weeks since we parted in Bristol Channel. It was some days before I could reconcile myself to the idea of parting with you and especially with the prospect before you of a rough and uncomfortable return to Bristol. I followed you in imagination until it became dark and then I concluded that you had somehow or other got safely to land while I was committed as the Yankees say to a 3000 miles voyage. Strange as it may seem I did not feel half the pain in leaving all England that I had several times felt in leaving a single hour in it. Thus may it be with us when leaving our earthly place of pilgrimage for our heavenly home. May it not be that in leaving all on earth for our Father's house, we shall feel less pain than in parting with single friends or particular pleasures here in our place of pilgrimage.

For the first 9 days we had head winds and a rough adverse sea. Our progress was but slow & it seemed as though we were to have a passage of 20 or 23 days. On the tenth day however the wind changed successfully and became fair through the voyage.
