Being thoroughly familiar with all the details of this branch of business, most important service can be rendered to claimants.

As he is in possession of much valuable information relating to Revolutionary Service, attention will be given to VIRGINIA LAND and HALF PAY CLAIMS; PENSION CLAIMS, and Claims for Bounty Land

under "Act of March 3d, 1855," and other acts, either original, suspended or rejected.

WIDOWS of Revolutionary Officers and Soldiers.

As Congress at its next session will pass an act explanatory of the 2d section of the "Act of February 3d, 1853," giving to the Widows of Revolutionary Officers and Soldiers, pensioned under that Act, five years back pensions, commencing March 4th, 1848, the undersigned will prosecute for the parties interested their claims under this act, and promptly forward them the amount due, upon the receipt of a power of attorney authorizing him to act for them.

Those widows of Revolutionary Officers and Soldiers who have been pensioned under the several acts of Congress, and who have not obtained their land bounty, can recover one hundred and sixty acres

of land, by addressing the undersigned.

te-It is confidently believed that the bill pending before Congress, granting half-pay for life, pursuant to the Resolves of the Continental Congress of the 3d and 21st of October, 1780, to the heirs at law of the officers of the Revolutionary War serving in the Continental Line; and also one hundred and sixty acres of land to the surviving child or children of Revolutionary Soldiers who served fourteen days, will pass by a large majority; and as I have evidence in my possession establishing the services of a majority of those entitled, especial attention will be given to this class of claims.

Parties writing in relation to these claims, will state the "Line" of the Army in which their ancestor

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The

CHICAGO, Aug. 28.—(P)—The nation's most powerful air beacon was turned on last night.

Touched off at the White House by President Hoover, the light sent a two billion candle power beam circling through the murky night. Invented and presented to the city by the late Elmer A. Sperry the light is visible in good weather 250 miles away.

The light of the blue-grey beam is equal to one square inch of the

is equal to one square inch of the sun's brilliance.

A second beam, of 1,100,000,000 candle power, remains fixed upon the municipal airport as a guide to aviators.

Many of the notables here for the National Air races attended the presentation. Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, for whom Sperry ramed the beacon in honor of b "heroic flight from New York Paris," did not attend.
