The rate of 5c was for a ½ oz. letter sent up to 300 miles to the border at Derby, Vt.

The rate of 4½d was from the exchange office at Stanstead to Sherbrooke, Canada East

During this rate period. letters from the U.S., could not be paid through to the destination, but either paid "to the lines" or sent completely unpaid. Letters from BNA had to be paid "to the lines" and could be paid to the destination. Mail traveling overland was exchanged between Robbinston, Maine and St. Andrews, NB.

May 5, 1842

The initial rate of 18<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>c was for a single letter sent 150-400 miles; the forwarding <u>unpaid</u> rate of 18<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>c was for the 150-400 miles "to the lines" at Robbinston, Maine.

The rate of 1 shilling, 7½ pence included the 18¾c from Boston (11½p), and the 8p rate from St.

Andrews to St. John.

This faint red 29½mm CDS ("Mas." at B) is reported used from July 5, 1841 to June 5, 1852.
