

In 1683 the English established packet services to provide regular service for government correspondence. This provided a monthly service that was eventually opened to regular mail. It was privately manned, but in the later stages naval vessels gradually replaced the civilian. When the Black Ball line started regular packet service, this was the only competition. The Falmouth packets did not sail to Halifax in the winter months. Therefor service was not very reliable.



What was a packet? In Britain, a packet was a ship contracted and controlled by the government. They carried government mail in addition to regular mail. During the period of this study, they sailed once a month but not during winter months. Americans define packets as a ship that sailed between two ports on a regular schedule summer and winter and departed sometimes without a full cargo hold.

The Black Ball Line started regular packet service between New York and Liverpool with the January 4, 1818 sailing of the Courier from Liverpool. The James Monroe made the first easterly voyage and departed New York January 5. To complete the schedule in February, the Pacific sailed from Liverpool and the Amity departed from New York.



Black Ball Line success did not go unnoticed. When the 1819 - 1820 recession did not hamper operations of Black Ball's packets, other companies slowly initiated their own packet services. The first was the Red Star Line. With four vessels, Meteor, Manhattan, Panthea and Hercules they started regular departures from New York to Liverpool on January 25, 1822, They maintained this schedule through the period of this study.

The Blue Swallowtail Line observed the Black Ball and the Red Star Lines' success and established a third packet service between New York and Liverpool.

With the Robert Fulton, Cortes and two charter vessels, the Indian Chief and Martha for a single voyage each, the Blue Swallowtail Line started packet service August 8, 1822. The charter vessels were replaced early 1823 by the Corinthian and the Leeds which filled out their permanent fleet.



The Leeds when departing Liverpool January 5, 1825, went aground on the North Bank. Also departing on January 5 were two Black Ball Packets, the Canada and the Florida. The cover indicates a New York arrival date of February 4, 1825. Research shows that the Florida arrived New York two days later with news boat, carrying mail to the city. These dates suggest that mail was transferred and continued to New York on the Florida.

The Leeds, when finally brought to Kings Dock Basin was declared irreparable. However, due to unique construction of American packets, although both bow and stern hung suspended in mid air for several days, she returned by March 16, 1825 to her schedule. American packets were constructed with first deck below top deck caulked and planked in same manner as top deck. This additional detail gave them a unique amount of structural strength, longer service and enhanced handling. Observing this detail, British ship builders adopted this technique.

The Black X Line provided packet service from New York to London starting in 1824. The initial fleet consisted of the Acasta, Hudson, Brighton and Crisis sailing the 1st of the month from New York and the 5th of the month from London.

A stop was scheduled at Portsmouth to either drop off or pick up mail. English law required ships to turn in any mail at the first port of call before breaking bulk cargo. Therefore many covers carried by these vessels bear postmarks from various out-ports along the English channel. Packets continued to London. Mail, dispatched to London by mail coach, arrived London before the vessel.

With the unexpected loss of the *Liverpool*, the Black Ball Line needed a temporary replacement until a new packet could be built.

The Captain of the Orbit, a Black Ball trader sailing between New York and Liverpool, had the experience to fill the void. She sailed three voyages during her short time as a packet and allowed the Black Ball Line to maintain their reputation for customer service and reliability.

The regular year round service provided by American packets proved important to business development, both in America and in Europe. In 1825 cotton speculation by American and Brazilian dealers caused oversupply in the Liverpool market. In April 1825, the packet *Florida* brought this information the United States

The Florida departed Liverpool April 17, 1825, and arrived New York May 17, 1825. Pushed by her crew, this amazing 30 day westerly crossing and the timely information prevented bankruptcy for many New York speculators. A 68 day crossing a year later shows the variable passage time on the westerly leg.








