
Dear Friends,

My dear friends,

As sister Sarah will soon send I would not omit the opportunity to write you a few lines. Yesterday was commencement at the Seminary, a day always dear to your remembrance & to ours. It might be termed a day of friendly salutations. How pleasant was the seasons we always had when Dr. Richards was with us - now Mrs Richards is seen no more here - she has gone to the blissful abodes to be with her husband, & children who had gone before her, ^{to be with them} forever: - How many we have met at our house on that day, our commencement we received sixty call from Misses, their wives & sisters & from the students. - I think 1/4 of the students took tea with us the day you & several others took leave of us for your stations where you have so long & so faithfully laboured, & with such abundant success. You recollect my father said, he should like a table long enough to accommodate all the students - what happy days are those when Christians meet, & how tender to the memory when they meet as on the occasion just referred to, expecting to see each other no more till the glorious meeting above when we shall all be gathered together in One. Dr. Richard greatly delights in those words of Paul, 'I charge you by our gathering together in one,' when all the saints from earliest time, & ~~until~~ to all time shall meet in one glorious assembly with the holy angels to be in the presence of Christ forever. Dr. Perrine is as you know now among the blest - & Mrs P. is writing her sister - she would rather be here with old friends

As the box is not yet closed I will write you a line, - I wish to let you know that last August mother had the happiness of seeing all her children at home, & some grandchildren. John came from Washington, he is not married, & Richard from Dover, with one out of ^{of his} six children was here. Amelia came from Bethel near Geneva with her two, & Martha from Canada, with her husband & babe.

I received ~~also~~ about two weeks ago a very beautiful letter from a Grecian youth, dated Salonica, March 21 ult. his name is Nicola M. Centropoulos & he then signs himself son of the Greek Captain. He wrote me to see if we here could aid him to an education, in order to his preaching to the Greeks. - I sh^d be happy to send when I send to the islands much more than I do. I send you ~~also~~ a watch case, & you, ~~also~~ ^{for you do you} ~~also~~ ^{of your cards} - I rejoice in the great usefulness of you all at the islands & when ever you send a box, do if you can write a few lines for me or if you can send me a letter by ship. I like to read such letters much, I ~~do~~ like to know you have not forgotten me,
