South Carolina Rail Road Routes 3131 & 5605

The South Carolina Canal & Rail Road Company was chartered in December 1827 and was the first road in the USA to carry passengers on the 6 miles of track west from Charleston to Sixmile in 1830.

By July 1854 Route 3131 was contracted for the 396 miles between Augusta, Georgia and Charleston including branches to Kingsville, Camden and Columbia. In 1874 Route 5605 of 261 miles was contracted at \$18,176 a year.


Envelope put onto the course of Route 3131 for Charleston to receive the Route Agent's date stamp (Towle 336-D-2) cancelling the 3 cent franking.

SO. & CA. R.R. / APR / 24

Postal card dated "April 24th 1875" and put onto Route 5605 on its course east to Charleston. Cancelled by the Route Agent's date stamp (Towle 336-E-1).

Note the missing "APR" date slug.

South Carolina Rail Road Routes 3101

Chartered in 1836 to build a branch line from the South Carolina Canal & R.R. Company's Charleston to Hamburg route 68 miles from Branchville to the State Capitol at Columbia. The first contract was for Route 2288 in October 1841.

By July 1847 the Company was renamed the South Carolina R.R. and the contract for Route 3104 was made at \$8,187 a year for a daily service. In July 1851 recontracted as Route 3101 at \$16,387 for the daily service.



SOUTH CAROLINA R.R. / DEC 11

Envelope file noted on reverse "Recd. Dec 13th 1851" addressed to Columbia and carried on Route 3101 on December 11th. The letter would have originated either on the Charleston to Branchville or Hamburg to Branchville portion of Route 3131 to receive the Route Agent's date stamp (Towle 336-D-3) and his 5 cent charge stamp for under 300 miles.



"S C R R / OCT 31" in Manuscript

Ladies envelope put onto Route 3101 on October 31st circa 1853 and manuscript endorsed by an employee of the rail road acting as the Route Agent. Towle illustrated 7 different written examples which do not include this one.

As the Route Agent was not a Post Office appointment he was not allowed to use a Post Office Department issued date stamp, hence the number of manuscript endorsements recorded by Towle.




Map by James T. Lloyd of 1862 with the course of the South Carolina Rail Road branch route between Branchville and Columbia.

Charleston to Augusta Route Agents Stamp Route 3125

South Carolina Rail Road

Chartered in December 1827 as one of the earliest roads in the United States. Completed from Charleston to Hamburg in October 1833 and by bridging the Savannah River to Augusta in 1833.

First contracted for mails in May 1839 as Route 2214 at \$27,000 a year for a daily service.


Envelope carried on the line circa 1853 to Charleston and prepaid with a 3 cent Scott 10 stamp cancelled by the route agents stamp (Remele S5-b).

SOUTH CAROLINA R.R. MAR / 27

Envelope addressed to Darlington Court House endorsed by addressee "March '53". Also prepaid using a Scott 10 cancelled by the route agents stamp (Remele S5-c).

Carried on the line to Branchville for transfer to the companies branch line to Camden. Transferred for the 44 miles east on the post roads to Darlington.







Envelope file noted "*Recd. Dec 13th 1851*" and carried on Route 3101 to Columbia. Rated at the 5 cent unpaid rate of July 1851.

North Eastern Rail Road Routes 5604 & 14005

The North Eastern Rail Road completed its 103½ mile line between Charleston and Florence in November 1856. The pre Civil War contract was reinstated in July 1866 as Route 5604 at \$7,772 a year for a daily service.


In July 1873 contracted as Route 14005 at \$13,905 a year, also for a daily trip.



NORTH EASTERN R.R. DEC / 12

Envelope put onto Route 5604 on December 12th circa 1866 addressed to Sumber. Carried north to Florence and transferred to Route 5254 to Sumter on the Charlotte & Rutherford Rail Road.

The Route Agent applied his date stamp (Towle 340-C-1) and cancelled the 3 cent franking with his obliterator.

Cheraw & Darlington Railway


The Cheraw & Darlington Railway was chartered in 1849 and opened in 1853 running from Cheraw to Florence in South Carolina. It was contracted for Route 5603 to give a daily service at \$1,200 a year.

The station of Doves was situated 22 miles south of Cheraw and 18 north of Florence. The cover shown travelled just 8 miles on the line from Cheraw to Darlington.

Envelope posted at Dove's franked with a Scott 114 pen cancelled stamp and addressed to Darlington. Struck with the Station Agents stamp (Towle 341-S-1)

GREENV. & COLUMBIA R.R. / SEP. / 12

Envelope put onto Route 5607 on September 12th circa 1867 and carried to Augusta. Carried to Cokesbury for transfer onto the 111/4 mile branch line to Abbeville.
