

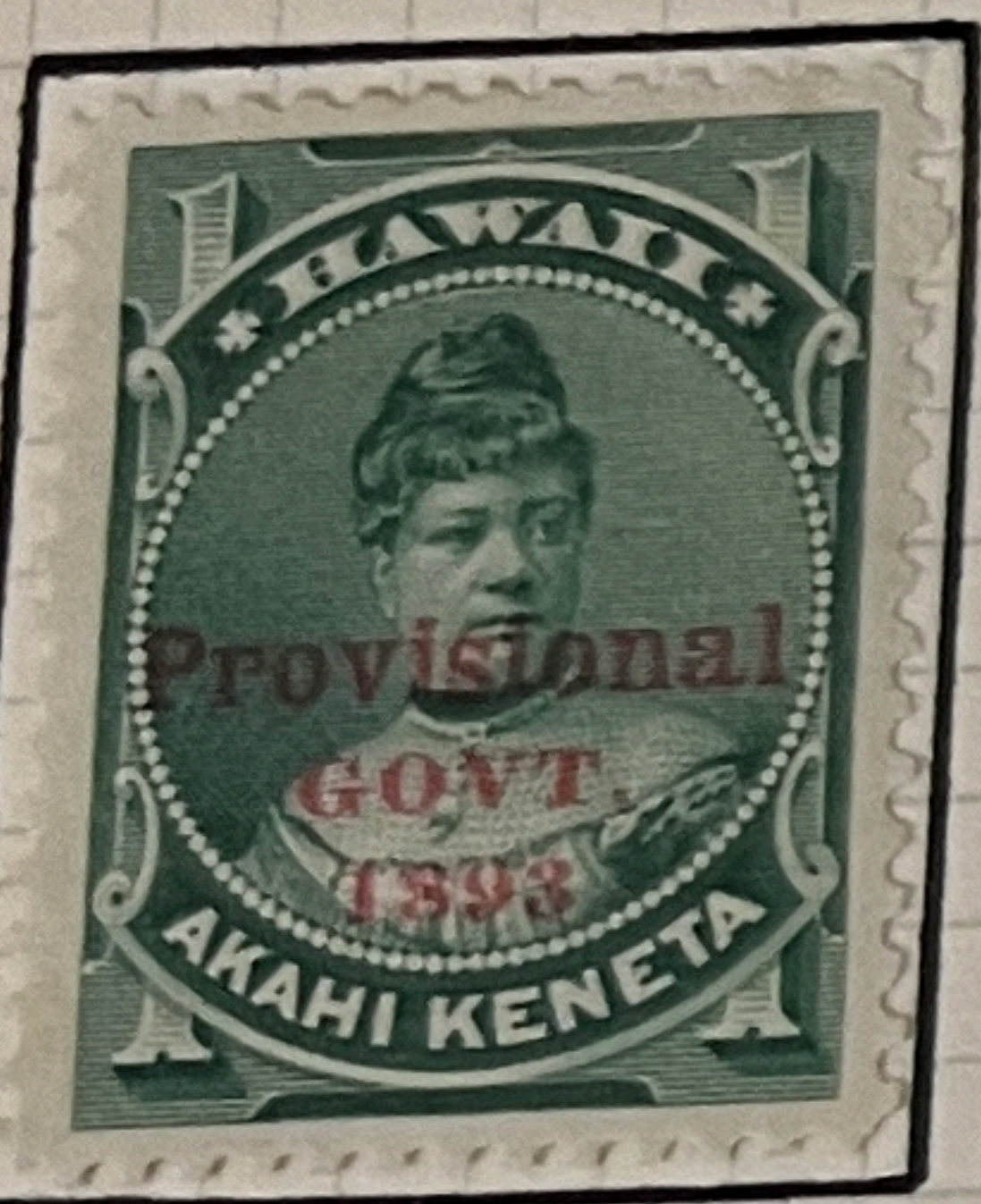



On reading over the letter, I feel that I may have confused the para: about the combinations of letters, I should have mentioned that this rule does not apply to the first three letters of the name but to any three of the rest of the name, If a stamp only shows the first three letters, it is likely that the stamp will at least show a part of the name of the Island in the lower name space and this will help solve the name of the office.

Was interested in reading about your various side-collections, I have had such collections from time to time, official sealed stamps and dead letter office. railway stamps, exhibition stickers, xmas seals, great war stickers, Commemoratives, (accumulated 16 vols of these). and many single issues of different countries, but Hawaii has always been my main collection and I have no intention of parting with this. I have a side-line at present, the King Geo V, head type, of the one penny Australian Commonwealth. with all the re-entries, flaws etc, very fine study, a rough sketch of this study will appear in one of the issues of the Stamp Specialist.




I have looked out an assortment of town cancels and have written on the back of each a number, this number you will find on the enclosed list. With one or two exceptions, one can take any cancel showing ONLY three letters and find the full name from this list, with only twelve letters the combinations are so many that as I have said there are only a few that have the same three or at the most four letter combinations.

I would greatly appreciate it, if you would remember to let me know at any future time if you locate any of the names marked on the list with a circle and dot. So many of these offices were only opened in 1899 and 1900, and I have not quite fixed the exact date of opening for those in 1900, so it is quite likely that some at least were not opened till after the annexation, if you should locate any I would like to see the stamps so that I could make sure of the type of cancel used.

The "Hawaiian Missionary" Stamps of 1851-1853



The first official Hawaiian post office was established in December 1850. Postmaster Henry M. Whitney had stamps printed locally in three denominations. Philatelists call these rare stamps "Hawaiian Missionaries" because virtually all were used by Christian missionaries on outbound mail. Only 28 covers with Missionary stamps are known to exist; only the Dawson cover (right) bears the 2¢ stamp. The two 13¢ stamps were unusual as they prepaid postage in two countries—Hawaii and the U.S.

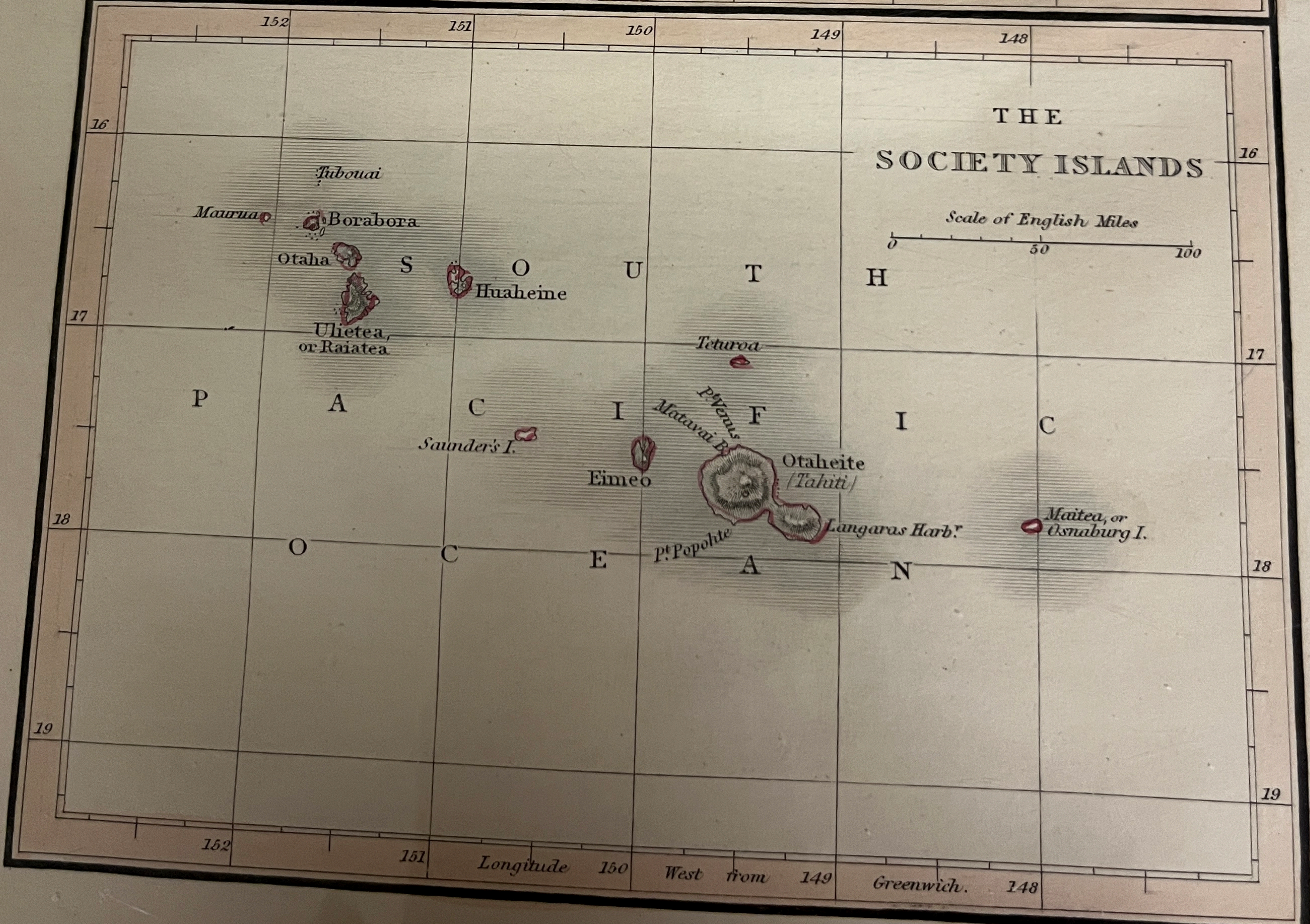
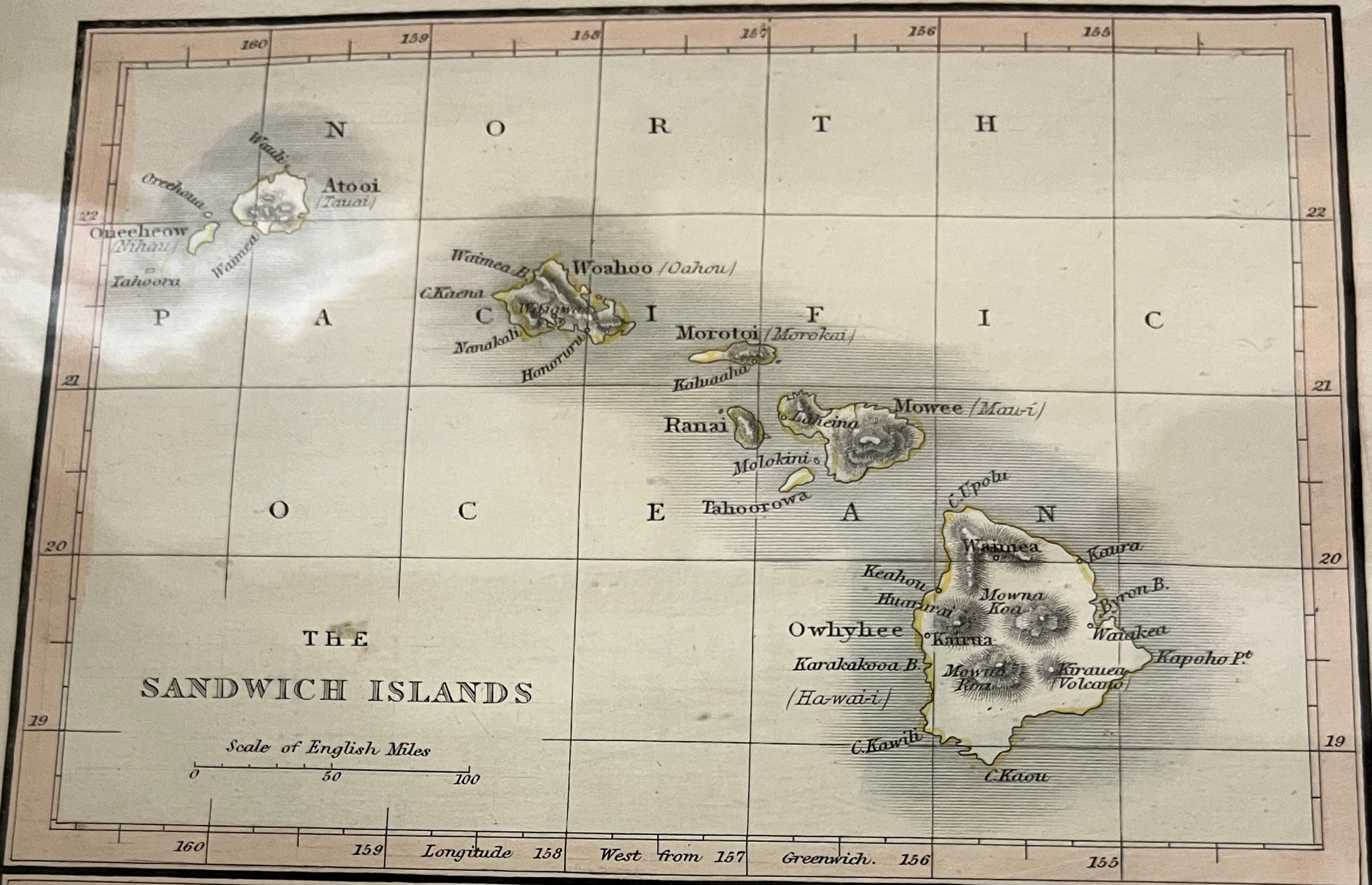

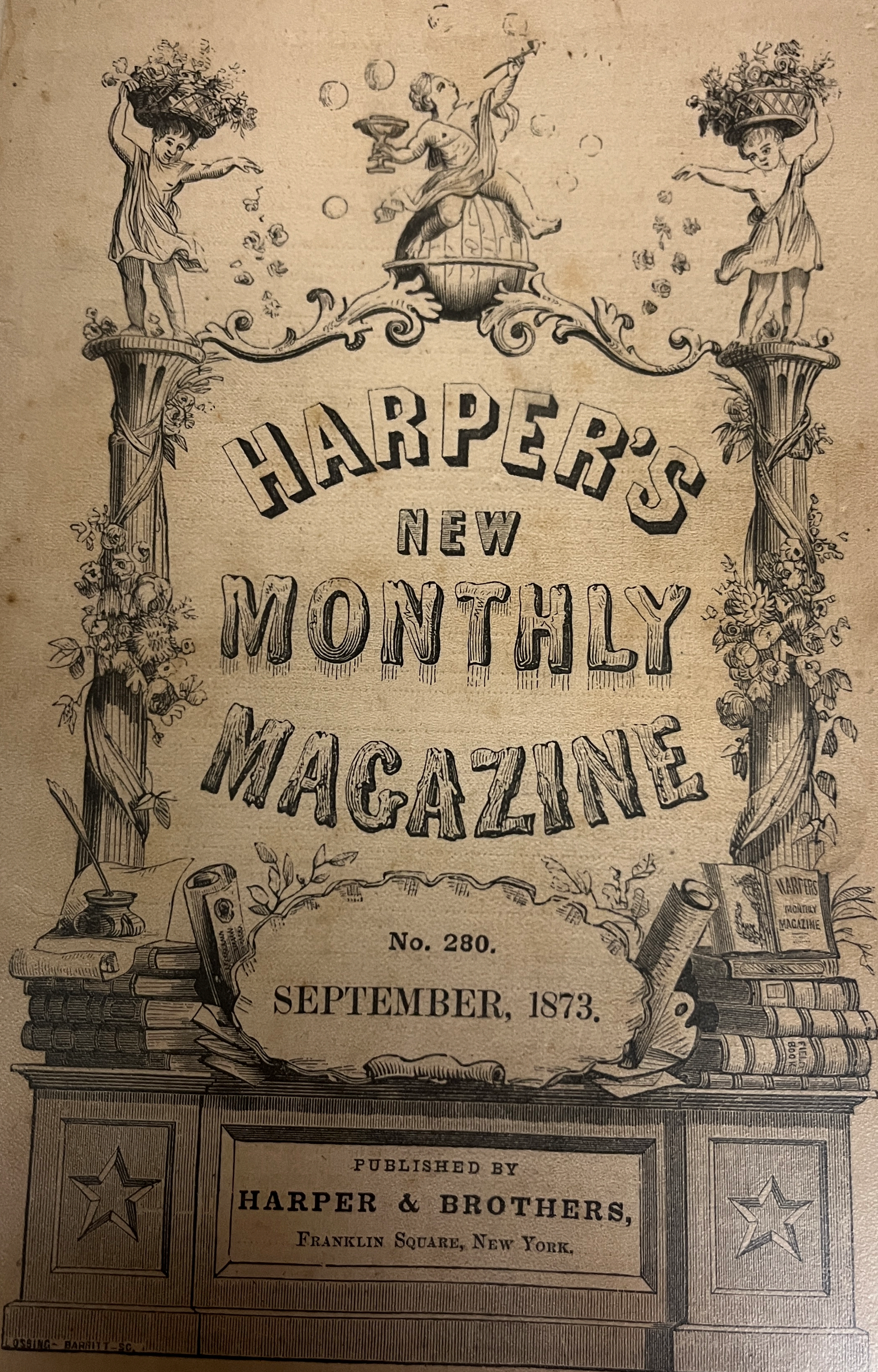
