We had extremely cold and pleasant winter weather. We have had 2 serious fires in the past ten days destroying a splendid flowering mill and one of the largest grocery stores in the city to loss to some 60, thousand dollars -- the news from the mines continues flattering.

The Pikes Peak (Jones & Russell Express) is still running most of the time comes and goes full of passengers. the last one there that went out took an Episcopalian Minister and his 3 daughters all young woman and nice for Denver City. They are carrying out passengers for 100\$ hundred.

Although you and B. J have not answered my last I considered to write you a short letter, my health about as usual, no news in our city of any especial interest, times still very dull. We had extremely cold and pleasant winter weather. We have had 2 serious fires in the past ten days destroying a splendid flowering mill and one of the largest grocery stores in the city to loss to some 60, thousand dollars -- the news from the mines continues flattering.
