
Central Overland California and Pikes Peak Express





Tuesday Eve No. 8 ~ Denver City June 1860



June 19, 1860 Denver City, K. T. Central Overland and California Pikes Peak Express To George Arthur Gray, Waltham, Massachusetts with additional bold pen Due 3 rate Letter bears two Central Overland and California Pikes Peak Express oval black handstamps dated July 19 and July 21 at Denver City with large circular blue Saint Louis circular handstamp on 3 cent red Nesbitt

Letter contains interesting observations about a trip up Clear Creek to the Gold Mines

Golden Gate, where we enter the Mountains through a very narrow pass where a small Brook finds its way from the Mountains to Clear Creek. The gully where we go is very narrow crossing the creek 49 times from Golden Gate to a point about 7 miles, where we leave it and climb the Mountain for about two miles very steep and then go down again into another Gully and so on for 10 miles, where we arrive at Gregory's digging's so called and in this vicinity there is Russell's Gulch, Lake Gulch, Missouri Flat, Illinois Gulch, Pleasant Valley and several others two numerous to mention.

Tuesday eve No. 8 Denver City June 19, 1860

My Dear Son

I received your letter which was mailed June 5th this evening, which is the first letter hat I have received since I left home, and you may rest assured that I was very much pleased with the letter and to hear that you was well, But I fear that Mother is not well, as you did not say any thing about here in your letter. I was please to hear that Mary had recovered from her Illness Oh how I would like see you all tonight. I am sorry to hear that they are setting fires again in Waltham, and I am very sorry indeed to hear that Mr. Harris was injured at the fire. Give my respects to him. How does Uncle Lyman get along without him I was pleased with your furniture but I do not think it was at first but I shall think a good deal of it nevertheless You spoke about Hens, if you look in the Barn behind Pompy's stall you will see some lime in a barrel. Take some of that and throw it around the Hen house and in the nests.

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some in the nests after taking the old hay out, and put some where they can roll in it throw your ashes under their roosts and that may do some good. it is the only remedy that I think of now. I was surprised that Uncle Cyrus was at Waltham. I did not think that he would visit there this Summer. poor man I pitty him from my heart, and you and Mother must to all that is in your power to make him comfortable while he stays with you.

It seem to be self destruction that he seeks while he is out of his head. I wish I was there to be company for him. You may ask how it happens that I am here to received your letter so soon, I have been to the Mountains twice, I cam down to sell the team and did not sell as I expected, but engaged a load of freight and went back, and cam down again last Saturday and sold them, and have waited until today when they mail was due to get a letter and have been well paid for my delay, I shall start tomorrow for the Mountains again, We have not got to work yet as Mr. Rogers claims are dry ones and we have to wait for water to work them. Which be next month,

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Mr. Rogers has gone prospect, and he May find some good claims, that we can work. It us hard to get good Claims now, they want about as much for one as you can get out of it. There is a great many people here this season, and a large number are leaving daily for the States. Mr. LaClair of Reading the Gentlemen that talked of coming here with Mr. Rogers had been here and started home today. He is sick of mining and I think I shall be when I try it I cannot conceive why I have not received a letter before how many have you and Mother wrote, I shall expect another in about 10 days in answer to the one that I wrote when I first arrived here I am glad that you made a visit to Marlboro; how does John and all of them do what is John doing this Summer?

Tell Mr. Kendall that I shall expect an answer to that letter that I sent him. I hope that you will be a good Boy, and help Mother all you can and mind what she says to you for you may not have here many years with you, and when she is gone May God grant that you may have nothing to regret. But what you don all that you could to please her and make her happy. but may the time be long before we part.

Denver is quite a pretty place, for a new one at an estimated population of 5,000 and an floating population of from door to door it is situated on the east Bank of the Platte River

here and go about 15 miles West, to Golden City a town that has been built since last August then we go two miles farther to Golden Gate, where we enter the Mountains through a very narrow pass, where a small brook finds its way from the Mountains to Clear Creek the gully where we go is very narrow from one rod to four acrossing the Brook 49 times from Golden Gate. to a point about 7 miles where we leave it and climb the Mountain for about two miles very steep and then go down again into another Gully, and so on for 10 miles where we arrive at Gregory's diggings so called and in this vicinity there is <u>Russels Gulch</u>, <u>Lake Gulch</u>, <u>Missouri flat</u>. <u>Illinois Gulch Pleasant Valley</u>, and several other two numerous to Mention.
