Grading and Condition

Superb	Extraordinary item in the finest condition.
Extremely Fine	Outstanding and exceptional quality.
Very Fine	Choice, first-class condition.
Fine-Very Fine (F-VF)	Stamp or cover in sound condition; if a stamp, it is slightly less well-centered than Very Fine but better centered than Fine.
Fine	Sound in all respects. Perforated stamps will have the designs clear of the perforations; the designs of imperforate stamps will not be cut in to any significant degree.
Very Good (VG)	Imperfect centering (stamps) or poor general appearance.

Any stamp faults such as a thin spot, tear, crease etc., will be described at all times. Postally used covers should be expected to have the normal degree of wear associated with them and this wear is not grounds for return. The grade of a cover is independent of the grade of the stamps on it. Covers from the famous Carroll-Hoy correspondence will normally have a small unobtrusive staple hole. In lots containing several items, degrees of condition denote the overwhelming average and examples above and below such condition can be expected.

Terms of Sale

Bidding

I. All bids (whether by floor bidders, mail bidders, or telephone bidders) will have a premium of 15% added to the auction sale price.

II. All bids are per lot as numbered in the catalog unless otherwise announced by the auctioneer at the time of sale. The right is reserved to withdraw any lot prior to sale, to divide a lot, or to group two or more lots, or to act on behalf of the seller. Schuyler Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. will execute bidding instructions on behalf of clients, but will not be responsible for any errors in the execution of such bids. Schuyler Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. is not liable for bidding errors related to live auction internet bidding and/or the loss of internet connection during the live auction.

III. The highest bidder shall prevail; lots are sold at one increment over the second highest bid. Should any dispute arise between bidders, the decision of the auctioneer as to the successful bidder and the reoffering or resale of the lot under dispute shall rest entirely on the judgment of the auctioneer. The auctioneer shall regulate the bidding and reserve the right to refuse any bid believed by him not to be made in good faith.

IV. Consignor has and retains the right to bid personally, or by his duly appointed agent, through the auctioneer, unless the sale is advertised and announced as one restricting such bidding by consignors or their agents.

Payments of Purchases

V. FLOOR BIDDERS. Floor bidders shall furnish the auctioneer their names and addresses prior to bidding on any lot. The name and address of the buyer of each lot shall be registered with the auction house following the sale of each lot. Payment of the whole purchase price shall be made by the floor buyer in such manner as the auctioneer may determine. Special credit arrangements must be made prior to the sale.

VI. MAIL BIDDERS. A successful mail bidder will be notified of lots purchased and must remit payment before the lots are sent. Auction bills are due and payable upon receipt of notification. If buyer's payment is not received within ten (10) days, Schuyler Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. may resell all lots without notice. Any and all losses incurred as a result of resale will be passed on to the defaulting buyer. Cost of postage, registration, etc. will be charged to buyer. Proof by the auctioneer of receipt of sending at the advised address shall constitute delivery.

VII. DIRECT DRAFTS/TRANSFERS. A successful mail bidder known to us may contact our office at (415) 781-5127 for the information necessary to pay directly into the vendor bank account. Any additional charges resulting from processing payments by this method shall be borne by the buyer. Method of payment should be noted on the bid sheet.

VIII. Title shall not pass to the buyer until full payment is received by Schuyler J. Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc.

IX. All of our lots are sold as genuine. Lots accompanied by recent (within 5 years of sale date) expert certificates are sold "as is" based on the description in the certificate. The aforementioned expertized lots may not be returned under any circumstances including those instances in which subsequent certificates yield conflicting opinions. The accepted authorities for U.S. stamps are the Philatelic Foundation (P.F.), the Philatelic Stamp Authentication and Grading, Inc. (P.S.A.G.) and the Professional Stamp Expertizing Committee (P.S.E.), however we do not accept "graded certificates", nor do we accept "encased" certified items.

X. The Auctioneer must be notified within 5 business days from the date of the auction of any request to place a lot on extension for expertising. All extensions must be paid in full, in advance. There will be no exceptions and no lots may be returned under any circumstances if this term has not been strictly followed.

XI. All lots on extension must be submitted for expertising by the auctioneer exclusively. Each lot is sold as genuine, except those described "as is", but when, in the opinion of a competent authority acceptable to Schuyler J. Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc., the lot is declared otherwise, the purchase price will be refunded in full. The lot must be received by Schuyler J. Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. within a period of 21 days from the date of auction. Expenses incurred for purposes of expertising shall be borne by the purchaser except where the lot is found by said competent authority to be materially not as described, in which case the consignor will be responsible for expertising costs incurred. Proof of the inability of said competent authority to express a definite opinion is not grounds for return of an item.

XII. Any lot, description of which is incorrect, is returnable (A) within three (3) days of receipt and (B) if received by Schuyler J. Rumsey Philatelic Auctions, Inc. within twenty-one (21) days from the date of the auction. All disputed lots must be returned intact, in the condition received; no adjustments will be made. The following lots are not returnable: lots containing ten (10) or more items; lots from purchasers OR THEIR AGENTS who had the opportunity to examine them before the auction; items described as having defects or of a quality standard "Very Good" (V.G.) or below; lots with disputed centering or margins when the item is photographed; lots described "as is".

XIII. JURISDICTION. In the event of any dispute between the auctioneer and bidders, or between any parties requesting inspection of any of the lots and the auctioneer, or between persons offering their lots to be auctioned and the auctioneer, the jurisdiction over the dispute shall be in the City and County of San Francisco, State of California.

XIV. In the event of any dispute, the prevailing party shall be entitled to court costs and reasonable attorney's fees.

XV. The California State Sales Tax - or that of another state as ordered by the laws of such a state (as appropriate) - is payable by buyers liable to tax. See below.

Due to the coronavirus outbreak, Rumsey Auctions has taken additional measures to continue operating and, more importantly, to protect the health of our clients and staff.



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The Robert S. Boyd Collection U.S. - German Mails to UPU

Fifteen years ago, while a freshman at George Washington University in Washington, DC, I ran a small stamp selling business on eBay out of my dorm room. One day, I noticed a buyer's address was just across the Potomac River in Virginia. As I did not know many philatelists in the area, I figured I would reach out and offer to meet. The person I reached out to that day was newly retired Robert S. Boyd, the owner of the exhibit collection being offered in this sale. Bob responded almost immediately with tremendous enthusiasm that he would love to meet-up and host me for a beer at a favorite spot in Pentagon City. The start of our friendship was memorable as I had to sheepishly explain that I was only 19-years old and could not legally get into a bar and have that beer. Bob pivoted quickly and offered the restaurant next door as our first meeting place.

Bob began collecting stamps 46-years earlier at age 11 in Pennsylvania. Bob's father who had also enjoyed the pursuit as a child introduced him to the hobby. Typical distractions in his late teens forced Bob to put his stamp collection aside. Following graduation from Dickinson College, Bob



entered the Army and went on to serve as an intelligence and infantry adviser in the Vietnam War – receiving the Combat Infantry Badge and a Purple Heart. Bob's family traces its heritage of military service to the American Revolutionary with subsequent generations fighting in every major conflict from the War of 1812 to World War II. After his service in Vietnam, Bob stayed in the Army and spent four years stationed in Germany. In 1977, Bob left the Army and accepted a civilian position at the Defense Intelligence Agency and a few years later switched over to the Air Force Intelligence Agency. On the morning of September 11th, 2001, Bob was working in the Pentagon when the hijacked American Airlines Flight 77 hit the building. That day and its aftermath would define the work of Bob's final career position as Director of the Air Force Intelligence Analysis Agency until his retirement in April 2005.

In 2005, when Bob and I first met at that restaurant in Virginia, he was just beginning to get reacquainted with all his favorite areas of the hobby. During his time in the Army, a coworker had also collected stamps and introduced Bob to the US Classics Period. This began a life-long passion for the 1851-57 Issue and especially the 1c Issue. As our friendship grew, I began encouraging Bob to find a specific area of interest and take a shot at exhibiting. During one of our conversations, Bob shared a story about his time in Germany and how much he enjoyed living there. That was the lightbulb moment – let's connect Bob's passion for the US 1851-57 Issue and interest in Germany.

Within a relatively short period, Bob had completely immersed himself in the study of Pre-UPU US-German mails. Bob relished the difficulty of the pursuit and commented frequently how studying a given cover helped him keep the core of his intelligence analysis skills sharp. In crafting the first outing of the exhibit, Bob also set himself another goal – to make the exhibit a teaching tool to help the broader philatelic world better understand the complex systems and markings that carried mail from the US to and through the various German states.

When the inaugural 3-frame version of the exhibit was ready to go on its first outing, I offered to be the courier. Due to a series of family needs with Bob as the primary caregiver, traveling to faraway stamp shows was not possible so I became a partner in the effort to give the exhibit as much visibility as possible. Over a 10-year period, the exhibit went up at World Series of Philately shows around the US eventually earning three Grand Awards and multiple gold medals. We also showed the exhibit at several exhibitions overseas. Bob received a Large Gold for the exhibit at the Brazil World Stamp Exhibition in 2013 (his very first time exhibiting at the FIP level). I always found a way to communicate with Bob from the shows no matter where in the world I was with the exhibit.

Though Bob is moving on from US-German mails, his collecting and study of other areas continues. Even with the tremendous focus on his exhibit, Bob continued to dive deeper into his research of the US 1851-57 Issue. In 2015, the Classics Society presented Bob with the Susan M. McDonald Award for his article, "The Travers Papers: Toppan, Carpenter, Casilear & Co." which provided a narrative structure for an archive of 643 original documents for the era of the 1851 Issue stamps. At present, in collaboration with other specialists, Bob is currently developing a website to showcase the reconstruction of the 1c 1857 Issue Plate 11 – the only plate to not be largely reconstructed.

Helping Bob take his exhibit, eventually growing to 10-frames, all over the world will remain one of the great privileges of my life in philately. Even more than that, I am honored to have Bob as my close friend. Bob and I are grateful to Schuyler and his team for their interest in showcasing this exhibit collection with its own single-owner sale catalog. Bob is excited for all the items in his exhibit to find new homes in collections and exhibits around the world through this sale. Finally, and in-line with Bob's original goals, he hopes that this catalog and the digital version of his exhibit will be useful to future generations in their pursuit and study of US-German mails.

Mail From the US To Germany Before the Universal Postal Union

ACCOUNTING

Transit fees for transatlantic letters were complex and usually not prepaid before 1852. Accounting between multiple states using different currencies was confusing. Before beginning the exhibit proper, a brief tutorial may help to understand accounting markings on the covers.

This early Bremen Mail cover is typical. The **red** letters on an image of the cover denote the accounting marks written by clerks at each stage of the journey to a breakdown of the total rate.

- Cincinnati applied its townmark (A) with a "10" showing US domestic postage paid.
- The New York Exchange Office stamped a black "24" (B) to show Bremen owed the US for sea transit.

• The Hanover PO in Bremen handled most Bremen Mail. It applied the "AMERICA ÜBER BREMEN" handstamp, wrote "9" to convert the 24¢ sea postage to *gutegroschen* (ggr) (C), stamped "10½" (D) to

show the total ggr due Hanover to pay transit and US sea postage, then wrote "46" (E) to convert ggr to *kreuzer* (kr) as a debit to the Thurn & Taxis postal system that handled mail to Württemberg.

- Thurn & Taxis added its 24 kr transit fee (F) and wrote the total as 1 florin 10 kr (70 kr—G).
- The Vaihingen PO added a 3 kr delivery fee (H) and wrote the final total due as 1 florin 13 kr (I).

Ship Letters and Privately Carried Mail

Even after transatlantic steamships became common, correspondents could halve the cost by sending mail to an intermediate destination for forwarding or across the Atlantic privately to enter the mails in Europe.

5001 🖂 **1835, 1841 United States to Germany via Union Line,** two folded letters: **1835 (Apr. 8)** New York N.Y. to Undingen, Württemberg carried by Union Line *Francis Depau* from New York Apr. 10th, French "Pays D'Outremer/Par Le Havre" framed handstamp with red crayon "48" kr final due rating; 1841 (Jun. 28) Plymouth Mass. to Göttingen, Hanover carried by Union Line *Oneida* from New York Jul. 1st to Le Havre arriving Jul. 22nd, red "Outre Mer, Le Havre" (7.22) arrival cds with red crayon "42" kr and red ms. "9½" ggr final due rating. Estimate.

A SCARCE USE OF THE NEW YORK POSTMASTER'S PROVISIONAL TO TRIESTE VIA LONDON.

As usual for this correspondence, this cover was sent to James Lang in England and forwarded to Trieste outside the mails.



5003 Germany 1847 (Feb. 23) New Orleans, La. to Dresden, Saxony, Redirected to Göttingen, Hannover, folded letter with "New Orleans La. Feb 23" cds with "Paid" h.s. and manuscript "25" prepaid rating for freight money fee and blue manuscript "10" for inland postage, carried by Black Star Line *Nicholas Biddle* from New York Mar. 5th to Liverpool arriving Mar. 26th, "Liverpool Ship/26MR1847" backstamp with manuscript "1/6" debit to Prussia, forwarded to Hannover, various German debits with final "22¹/4" ggr. due rating, Very Fine, One of only three recorded freight money covers to Germany.

Letter prepaid 25¢ steamship freight money fee plus 10¢ inland fee to New York in anticipation of going on board the new steamship Sarah Sands, marked in blue ink, upper right. Letter arrived in New York after steamer left so New York postmaster placed it on sailing ship to Liverpool and refunded unused portion of freight money fee. London marked 1/6d debit to Prussia and sent letter on steamer to Hamburg. Prussians marked 16-2/3 sgr. for 1846 Anglo-Prussian Convention fees owed them (15 sgr. to U.K. and 1-2/3 sgr. for Hamburg transit). Prussia added 5 sgr. transit fee and debited Saxony 21-2/3 sgr. (not shown), which Leipzig converted to 218 npf. Postage due at Dresden was 234 npf with 16 npf added for Saxony transit. Letter redirect to Hannover and marked for 22¼ ggr. postage due.


Ocean Line Washington made its maiden voyage on June 1st 1847. This letter was intended for its August voyage, which was postponed for mechanical reasons. This letter was sent by private sailing ship as a result.

THE EARLIEST RECORDED USE OF THE 1847 ISSUE TO GERMANY.

The first U.S. steamship sailed in June 1847. During the retaliatory time period, the British charged sea postage on prepaid mail carried by U.S. ships. So to avoid the double payment, the sender specified "Engl. Steamer". The total postage paid by the sender and addressee was 45¢.

5006 Apr. 3) Boston, Mass. to Cassel, Kurhessen, gray folded datelined letter endorsed "via Ostend & Coln" at top, carried privately on Cunard Line *Niagara* from Boston Apr. 3rd to Liverpool arriving Apr. 16th, entered mails prepaid with red "London, Paid" (4.16) cds and matching red "P" oval handstamp with red ms. "1/8" prepaid rating, red ms. "1/4" credit, red "Aus England, per Aachen Franco" framed handstamp; Prussian blue ms. "f 3 1/3" credit to Thurn & Taxis, indistinct arrival backstamp, Very Fine.

The steam packet "Franklin" also left New York on Feb. 8th, but the sender directed the letter to go via New York and Le Havre without paying the 24¢ ship letter fee. So, it was sent by sailing vessel without charge. The French transit was 6 decimes, or 18 kr, plus Thurn & Taxis 4 kr transit for total due of 22 kr.

"57" debit rating, German (4.17) arrival backstamp and red crayon "57/1" final due rating, Very Fine and scarce use. Estimate.
- 5009 Kar. 1) New Philadelphia Pa. to Herrenberg, Württemberg, blue folded letter with sharp "New Philadelphia O. Mar 1" cds and matching "Paid" handstamp with ms. "20" rating, light red "New York, Am. Packet, Mar 14" exchange cds, carried by Havre Line *Nashville* from New York Mar. 14th to Le Havre arriving Mar. 28th, red "Outre mer Le Havre" (3.28) entry cds, Herrenberg (3.31) arrival backstamp, red ms. "14/6" totaled to "20" kr due, Very Fine, *ex-Feldman*. Estimate.

The French transit was 5 decimes, or 16 kr, plus Thurn & Taxis 6 kr transit for total due of 20 kr.

A RARE CSA BLOCKADE-RUN COVER TO GERMANY.

Henry Watson Jr. was a lawyer and planter in Greensboro Ala., during the Civil War he relocated to Europe, his papers (including the letter carried in this cover) can be found in the Duke University Libraries.

Blockade runners were essential for vital supplies and correspondence with Europe.

5012 Karleston and Nassau, light buff cover to Henry Watson in Heidelberg, Germany via Charleston and Nassau, light buff cover to Henry Watson in Heidelberg, Germany, routed to Charleston and carried by blockade-runner *Alice* to Nassau arriving Jul. 7th, it entered the British Mails with partial red "Nassau, Paid, JY 11 63" cds with red crayon "2/8" double-weight credit rating, blue crayon "2" pence local rating, carried by Cunard Line *Corsica* from Nassau Jul. 31st to New York arriving Aug. 4th, then Cunard Line *Africa* from Boston Aug. 5th to Queenstown arriving Aug. 15th, red London Paid (8.17) transit datestamp and "PD" oval, Calais (8.18) transit datestamp, reverse with Paris-Strasbourg (8.18) and Heidelberg (8.19) framed arrival backstamps, pencil Aug. 19th receipt docketing, explicit route notations on back "Via Nassau, London, Calais, Paris, Strasbourg" as often found on this correspondence, **Very Fine**, *ex-Walske*.

AN OUTSTANDING AND RARE BLOCKADE-RUN COVER TO GERMANY FROM THE WATSON CORRESPONDENCE.

This double-weight cover was prepaid 2s 10d for two-times the 1d local postage plus two-times the 1s 4d rate to Germany.

Since the 1857 US-France Convention had no provision for printed matter, postage due was based upon conventions between the European states. US Postage was 2¢ per circular.

1847 US-Bremen Agreement

In 1847, the US concluded its first international postal agreement with the free city of Bremen. The city was separated by Hanoverian territory from its port, Bremerhaven, at the mouth of the Weser River. The Hanover Post Office in Bremen handled most of Bremen's mail because of its extensive rail network with the German states. This agreement was superseded by one with the North German Union in 1868.

1847-1851 24¢ International Rates

The first period included the packet charge of 24¢ in all three international rates, which differed because of U.S. postage. Nothing was charged for mail from New York City (24¢ rate), 5¢ for letters from places up to 300 miles away (29¢ rate), and 10¢ from places over 300 miles (34¢ rate).

Letter sent to Oberamt of Brackenheim since there was no post office in Ochsenbach. On first five voyages of Ocean Line to Bremerhaven, Bremen charged ³/₄ ggr. for transit from Bremerhaven to Bremen. Bremen debited Hannover 9³/₄ ggr. Hannover debited Thurn & Taxis Post 11 1/12 ggr. (equivalent to 49 kr.). Thurn & Taxis Post added 24 kr. transit but debited Württemberg 77 kr. instead of 73 kr., or 1 fl. 17 kr. Württemberg added 3 kr. and Oberamt added 2 kr. for total postage due of 1 fl. 22 kr. Less than 20 covers have been recorded showing the ³/₄ggr. transit fee.

The charge for mail addressed to Hanover was 2 ggr and for mail transiting Hanover 1 1/3 ggr. By agreement with Hanover and the US, Bremen did not charge transit fees. Because of the complexity of calculating postage transiting several states, the US Post Office recommended paying only the International Rate, leaving the German postage due; such letters were marked "PAID PART." Due to this guidance, letters with full postage paid were uncommon and were marked "PAID ALL".

Thurn & Taxis Post added 24 kr. transit fee to Württemberg and wrote the total as "1/10" for 1 florin 10kr. Vaihingen added 3kr delivery fee for final total due of "1f13" (1 florin 13 kr).

The Hannover post in Bremen debited Hannover 9 gutegroschen, a restatement of the 24¢ U.S. debit. The "9 America/über Bremen" handstamp was introduced in May 1849 and is known in black ink on this one voyage only. Hannover marked 10 1/3 ggr. debit to Thurn & Taxis Post, later marked as 45 kr. Thurn & Taxis Post added 6 kr. transit fee to Baden, where 8 kr. Baden internal fee also was added for total postage due of 59 kr.

Bremen Closed Mail was used throughout 1851-52 to meet demand. This cover was endorsed to go in British Open Mail by US packet, but instead were sent by Bremen Closed Mail.

The Prussian Closed Mail rate to Switzerland was 35ϕ , since this was only prepaid 30ϕ , it was accepted and rerouted via Bremen mails at the 19 ϕ treaty rate. It could also have been sent by PCM for Aachen marked "Paid to Border".











The letter was properly paid for the 28¢ Prussian closed mail rate, but must have weighed just over $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Since 2 x 28¢ = 56¢ had not been paid for this route, the New York exchange office clerk sent the letter in the Bremen mail at two-times the 15¢ Bremen rate = 30¢ rate and accepted the 2¢ short payment. The New York marking shows a credit to Bremen of 2 x 12¢ = 24¢.

Registered Mail

An article for the exchange of registered mail was added to the Bremen agreement in August 1855. Prepayment was required, including a registration fee of 5¢ payable in cash.

An article for the exchange of registered mail was added to the Bremen agreement in August 1855. Prepayment was required, including a registration fee of 5¢ payable in cash.

The Bremen City PO transmitted mail to Scandinavia directly through Hamburg, so this cover does not have the "AMERICA UBER BREMEN" marking of the Hanover PO in Bremen. Hamburg marked it "FRANCO" and credited Sweden with 5 sgr $(11 \, e)$ in red crayon (lower left). The distinctive red "Recomandirt" (Registered-line over m indicates a double letter) marking was also used by the Prussian PO. Sweden marked the letter with a blue manuscript "Rekdr." (Rekommenderat-Registered) at top right.

This remarkable cover was the subject a Chronicle article by George Hargest in August 1972 (No. 75, pp 151-153). In the article, he notes that during this time the Papal States were not yet a part of the Kingdom of Italy. Uprisings, led in part by Garibaldi, had reduced their territory to Rome and a narrow strip of coastline which also contained the port of Civitavecchia. Napoleon III of France sent a contingent to help protect Papal interests. A majority of mail sent during this time was fully prepaid to destination and sent via French Mail. The Bremen-Hamburg route was only in existence from February 1, 1867, until January 1, 1868. It was compulsory that letters sent by this route be prepaid by stamps, with the final postage to destination collected from the recipient. In 1870, at the start of the Franco-Prussian War, the French troops were called home and after a short battle the remaining Papal States territory was incorporated into Italy.

Hargest also quotes from the U.S. Mail and Post Office Assistant for March 1867, which discusses the general state of affairs of the Italian postal system: "But, with all these improvements, the postal system of Italy is still very far behind the English and American systems... Our clerks could hardly, with impunity, fail to find a pile of letters of letters that had been in the office for many weeks, or to destroy others for the sake of making a stamp album. They do so in Italy yet. It is rather desirable to be forewarned that a rare American stamp on a letter will probably ensure its being stopped by the post office. Report says the wives of certain postmasters in Italy have the richest albums in Europe."

The fully prepaid rate to Switzerland via Bremen was 27¢ from 1857 to 1860. It dropped to 19¢ when Th. & T. eliminated its transit fee. A prepaid letter was charged a flat fee of 4ϕ Swiss postage, but the actual cost was based upon distance.

Printed Matter

Printed matter sent under the 1847 agreement could not be prepaid until April 1854, when the agreement was modified to permit newspapers carried by the Bremen steamers to be sent anywhere in the GAPU for 3¢. Newspapers (including circulars) sent directly to Bremen were only 2¢. New York marked such printed matter PAID ALL in red or black.

Newspapers sent by either the Bremen or Hamburg Lines required 3¢ prepayment, which was to fully pay the newspaper to another part of the German-Austrian Postal Union. Apparently, the Austrians collected an additional 2 kreuzer local charge. Large 43x9 mm. PAID ALL applied at New York.

Effective February 1867, the Bremen and Hamburg Posts agreed upon new rates with the US. Credit markings replaced the PAID ALL marking in use through 1866. Since there was no ½¢ stamp, mandatory prepayment for the "Other GAPU" rate was by 2¢ in stamps. The credit was the same regardless of packet nationality.

1848 US-UK Convention (British Open Mail)

The outcry from merchants over the Retaliatory Rate forced the two governments to negotiate a convention, resulting in the 1848 US-UK Convention, which took effect in February 1849. It required that letters be paid to reach the UK, after which they were unpaid letters with postage due from addressees.

The UK had postal conventions with key north German states, so mail to them was usually sent directly or through Belgium and Prussia. France had postal conventions with south German states and Thurn & Taxis, so mail to them was usually routed through France. Since the markings and accounting are different, German transit and French transit are treated as separate sections under British Open Mail.

Standard GAPU postage varied by weight and distance. Several states continued to use their own currencies after the GAPU and this cover shows postage due in Bremen *grote*.

This cover shows the London ms. "8" pence debit for British and Belgian transit. A Prussian clerk converted that to 6 2/3 sgr, added 3 sgr postage, and marked "9 2/3" in blue. Some other clerk saw the UK debit had not been crossed out and added it again for "16 2/3". That error was carried on in Saxony and converted to "16 8/10" neugroschen, almost doubling the real postage due.

The convention permitted the US to charge 10¢ domestic postage from the West Coast because of the added expense. For example, the top cover went by steamship from San Francisco to Panama, was carried across the isthmus to the port of Chagres, and then sent by steamship to New York.

This letter was prepaid 20¢ for the Bremen international rate. The New York exchange office accepted it as full 21¢ prepayment for U.S. packet.

1848 US-UK Convention - Printed Matter

Until the 1867 US-NGU Convention, over three-quarters of printed matter from the US to Europe went by British steamship lines because they had the most departures and the trips were a few days faster. Also, the Bremen, Prussia, and Hamburg agreements required printed matter to be fully prepaid. Merchants preferred sharing their mailing costs with recipients.

Most British Open Mail circulars to Germany went via France, which had extensive conventions with the German States.

Most British Open Mail circulars to Germany went via France, which had extensive conventions with the German States. In the GAPU, the Austrian kreuzer Convention Münze equaled the south German kreuzer. In 1855, the UK and France replaced accounting for individual pieces of printed matter with bulk accounting handstamps.



1852 Prussian Closed Mail Agreement

In 1852, the US and Prussia concluded an agreement for direct exchange of closed mail bags by American and British packets between exchange offices in New York, Boston, and Aachen. The single rate was 30¢ from any place in the US to any place in the GAPU; prepayment was not required. Prepaid mail shows a credit in red of 7¢ to Prussia to pay Belgian and GAPU fees.

Frequent, reliable steamship service made Prussian Closed Mail the most commonly used means to send mail to the German States. The British Cunard Line provided weekly service alternately from NY and Boston and the American Havre Line monthly service from NY. Additional service was provided by the US Ocean Line (1851-57), Collins Line (1851-58), and Vanderbilt Line (1855, 57-60); the British Inman Line (1857-67); and the German Hapag Line (1860-67) and NGL Line (1858-67).

This agreement was superseded by the US-North German Union Convention effective 1 January 1868.






Aachen was the exchange office for Prussian Closed Mail and is the westernmost city in Germany, located near the borders with Belgium and the Netherlands in a coal-mining area. Aachen developed from a Roman settlement and spa, subsequently becoming the preferred medieval Imperial residence of Emperor Charlemagne of the Frankish Empire, and, from 936 to 1531, the place where 31 Holy Roman Emperors were crowned Kings of the Germans.

The envelopes were most commonly sold in California, so Prussian Closed Mail covers from there often have two 10¢ stamps affixed to one 10¢ envelope; from the rest of the US, payment by three 10¢ stamps is more common.



In September 1861, the US Post Office Department reduced the prepaid letter single rate to most German states from $30 \notin$ to 28 % due to a British reduction of 1d (2 %) postage to those states. By British-Prussian agreement, the single rate for letters was reduced by 2d, half of which was extended to the transit of US mail.

In May 1862, the reduction was applied to all German States except Baden, which was included one year later. The rate for unpaid mail remained at 30¢.

PCM – Unpaid Mail

Prepaid mail rarely had German currency markings, but unpaid mail from the US always did to show the postage due. Smaller states often used multiple currencies, so Aachen would mark the postage due in both silbergroschen (sgr) and kreuzer (kr). Unpaid mail shows a single-rate debit in black of 23¢, which Prussia paid the US from postage collected from the addressee.

The New York exchange office weighed the letter and determined two rates were required. Existing regulations permitted sending the letter if at least one full rate was prepaid, with the remaining postage to be collected at destination. New York credited Prussia 7¢ for the one rate paid and debited Prussia 23¢ for the one rate unpaid. Aachen marked "halbf" in blue ink to indicate that half the rate was paid as an explanation for the additional postage due rate of 45 kreuzer, the remaining unpaid rate. This cover was referenced in Chronicle 181, parcel post. 58-67.

There was a widespread misapprehension in the latter half of the 1850's that a 24¢ rate to Germany existed. The 24¢ postage made the clerk think this was mail to England, so he applied the "19" cent exchange credit cds, then replaced it with "Short Paid" and the correct debit as totally unpaid. The "45" kreuzer and "1234" (usually 13) sgr debits were equivalent to the 30¢ Prussian Closed Mail rate.

Ashbrook's note on reverse interpreted the late use of the 24¢ 1860 issue as "Old Stamp Not Recognized", but this was actually a short payment of the 30¢ Prussian Closed Mail rate treated as totally unpaid.

US post offices usually did not use "Registered" markings; the originating post office and the NY exchange office assigned registry numbers. Aachen marked a registered letter with a red "Recomandirt" (Recommandirt-Registered) and the weight in Prussian Loth (1 Loth = 1/2 oz). This letter weighed "4/10" Loth Wurttemberg and marked "recommand".

The Aachen Exchange Office began using blue ink for their markings in 1865. This quadruple-rate wrapper had the registry fee paid by a stamp rather than cash, which was common practice by this time.

The convention with the North German Union became effective 1 January 1868, and ended the Prussian Closed Mail agreement. Instead of the customary "AACHEN FRANCO" marking for Prussian Closed Mail, this cover bears the marking of the Verviers-Coeln Railway Post Office, the name of the Aachen Exchange Office under the NGU convention. The December 5, 1867 date on this and one other cover is its earliest known use.





As long as one full Prussian Closed Mail rate was paid, a letter would be sent paid to the GAPU border with the addressee responsible for any postage due. The two-line "Franco Preuss: resp:Vereinsl:Ausg:Gr." handstamp (Paid to Border of GAPU Member Prussia) was used on such mail until mid-1860, when a three-line handstamp superseded it. Goldach and Emmishofen were in Rayon I next to Germany, so actual postage due was only 3 kr or 10 rappen (2ϕ).

1857 US-Hamburg Agreement

In July 1857, the US and the City of Hamburg signed an agreement with the same terms as the 1847 Bremen Agreement. Hamburg Amerikanische Paketfahrt Aktien Gesellschaft, better known as Hapag or the Hamburg-American Line, provided biweekly service from NY to Hamburg.

In 1858, the US and Bremen abolished the 22¢ rate after Thurn & Taxis adopted a lower transit fee and reduced the US postage of the international rate from 5¢ to 3¢, increasing the share for sea transport. The Hamburg agreement did not include these amendments until 1859 and 1863, respectively.

This agreement was superseded by the US-North German Union Convention on 1 January 1868.

The sender of this cover was aware of the reduction in the Bremen rate six months earlier and wrote "Bremen Steamer, Paid 15 cts." at left. That steamer, "Weser", was damaged at sea and not scheduled to carry mail on its April 2nd 1859 sailing. Despite prepayment of only 15ϕ , the New York exchange office sent it as a fully prepaid 22ϕ letter on the Hamburg packet.

24¢ Mistaken Rate

As Robert Boyd discusses in his May 2010 Chronicle article "Mistaken 24¢ Rate to Germany, 1857-61", there was an apparent widespread misapprehension in the latter half of the 1850s that a 24¢ rate to Germany existed. In the Boyd collection are seven covers showing payment of exactly 24¢. They were sent from New York (2), Ohio (2), Michigan, Indiana, and Louisiana between 1857 and 1861.

When a U.S. exchange office decided to send one of these letters by Bremen, Hamburg, or France, 24¢ sufficed to pay the full rate, so it was merely overpaid. However, such a letter was considered unpaid in Prussian closed mail, since partial payment of the 30¢ rate was not permitted. This was an expensive error, as 24¢ in 1860 was worth about \$5 today.

As stated above, the following are two lots show the 24¢ "Mistaken" rate via Hamburg. Unlike Prussian Closed Mail, 24¢ exceeded the Hamburg packet rate, so letters by this route were accepted as paid.

It appears the sender reused the left 10¢ stamp to attempt to pay the "mistaken" 24¢ rate.

The sender prepaid the cover for the "mistaken" 24¢ rate, which confused the New York exchange office who initially struck the red "3" credit handstamp used on mail at the 24¢ rate to Great Britain.

A SCARCE AND DESIRABLE BLOCK OF EIGHT OF THE 1857 3¢ TYPE IV USED ON A COVER TO GERMANY.

This exceedingly rare on-cover multiple of the 3ϕ type IV is especially desirable because one can clearly see the identifying characteristics of the type, the interrupted framelines between stamps.

Bucks, Ohio accepted this letter as single-rate for 24ϕ , paid by a rare block of eight 3ϕ Type IV. The New York Exchange Office found the letter required two rates (30ϕ). To avoid treating it as unpaid, New York sent it as "PART PAID" with the full double rate to Hamburg (20ϕ) and kept the extra 4ϕ prepayment.

Rounding among the various currencies was imperfect. Had this letter been fully paid, the GAPU transit share would have been 10ϕ . It was not, so the GAPU double rate of 12 kr (only 8ϕ) applied.



AN EXCEPTIONALLY RARE 1857 ISSUE COVER TO EGYPT VIA BREMEN-HAMBURG MAILS.

Egypt is a rare destination with the 1857 issue and the slower, more affordable Bremen-Hamburg mails were seldom used. The 30¢ rate to Egypt was 8¢ cheaper than the Prussian Closed mail.

Printed Matter

As we have seen in Bremen, there was confusion about the price for fully paid circulars, with 2¢ frequently deemed sufficient postage. The following newspaper wrapper was correctly paid 3¢ in cash.

The rates were clearly stated as 3¢ for newspapers and 1¢ per ounce for pamphlets to any destination in the GAPU. Circulars were not mentioned specifically. The reason for the confusion is uncertain, but many circulars paid by 2¢ in stamps were accepted as fully paid, as the following cover shows. The NY Exchange Office marked it "PAID ALL;" Hamburg accepted New York's determination and marked it "FRANCO."

Although origin markings do not appear on this wrapper, three other wrappers are known in the same hand and to the same addressee in Brunswick, all from Belleville, Illinois. "Via Bremen or Hamburg" routing instructions would indicate contract steamship service of either the North German Lloyd Line to Bremen or HAPAG Line to Hamburg, setting the date after July 1, 1857 when the Hamburg Treaty began. New York marked the red PAID ALL because the newspaper was paid to destination. Absence of a Bremen arrival markings indicates HAPAG steamer to Hamburg.

Prepaid normal printed matter rate for most circulars overseas. New York elected to place it in the mails carried to Hamburg under the Hamburg Convention, even though the newspaper rate beyond Hamburg was 3¢, allowing the 1¢ underpayment. Hamburg struck the small FRANCO based on New York's PAID ALL handstamp. Steamship determined by best fit of sailings and the Hamburg arrival date shown on reverse.

Circular paid printed matter rate to Hamburg when the rate to Prussia via Hamburg was 3ϕ . Although underpaid by 1ϕ , circular allowed to go through since New York marked PAID ALL handstamp in black ink across adhesive.

Prepaid the 2ϕ printed matter rate to Hamburg when the rate via Hamburg to Bremen was 3ϕ . Although underpaid by 1ϕ , the circular was allowed to go through. Large "1" handstamp of New York, known in red and in black, applied as a result of late 1866/early 1867 negotiations with the Germans that established printed matter rates beyond the GAPU and set U.S. credits per item.

1867 US-North German Union Convention

The US and Prussia led a movement to simplify postage rates. At an International Postal Conference in Paris in May 1863, delegates from sixteen postal administrations agreed to work to reduce international rates and to abolish closed mail transit fees.

In 1867, after its victory in the Austro-Prussian War, Prussia formed the North German Union and took over the Thurn & Taxis postal system. In that same year, the two leaders of the movement to simplify postage rates concluded a new agreement that began to implement the goals of the 1863 Paris conference.

The US-NGU Convention, effective 1 January 1868, not only reduced the 15¢ Bremen-Hamburg direct mail rate to 10¢ and the 28¢ PCM rate to 15¢, but greatly simplified accounting. Additional conventions in 1870 and 1871 further reduced postage rates. The German Empire succeeded the NGU in January 1871 after Prussia won the Franco-Prussian War. A final agreement in 1873 permitted postal cards.

The US-NGU Convention set the stage for the 1875 General Postal Union.

1868-70 Rates - 10¢ Direct Mail

The direct mail part of the convention continued mail service from New York to Bremen and Hamburg by the NGL and Hapag Lines.

German mail steamers often made stops in English ports to drop off passengers and mail for and via England, but then continued to Germany. The same ship could offload closed mail bags in England and carry mail directly to Germany.

1868-70 Rates - 10¢ Closed Mail

Like Prussian Closed Mail, steamships landed mail for Germany in England. Because of the reduced transit fee, closed mail was now only 15¢ instead of 30¢ or 28¢. The 15¢ Lincoln was commonly used.

Aachen was again designated the Exchange Office, but the regulations clarified it as "The Traveling Post-Office No. 10, between Cologne and Verviers," not "Aachen" as it was called under the PCM Convention.

The sender intentional overpaid for closed mail. The trains from San Francisco to New York via Chicago took 7-8 days. If early or late, it would have had to go by closed mail.

1870 NGU Direct Mail - 7¢ Rate

The US and NGU concluded an additional postal convention effective 1 July 1870. Due to agreement by the Hapag and NGL Lines to accept reduced compensation, the direct mail rate became 7¢.

The Franco-Prussian War broke out on 19 July 1870. Direct mail service was suspended. The closed mail route remained open. The decisive Prussian victory at Sedan on 2 September 1870 left no doubt about the outcome of the war, and direct mail service resumed 29 October 1870.

Department of the Interior

Congress authorized official stamps in March 1873. Stamps for each department of the executive branch were issued in July 1873. Of the eleven known official stamp covers to Germany, only this and one other were used before the General Postal Union went into effect.

Although not part of the Interior Department, the Smithsonian Institution had a close relationship with it and used Interior stamps.

A RARE USE OF THE 6¢ INTERIOR DEPARTMENT ISSUE ON COVER TO GERMANY.

Lester C. Lanphear, in his comprehensive study of Official covers to foreign destinations in Chronicle 239 (Aug. 2013), records only 126 covers to any foreign destination. For the Interior Department he records 21 covers, mostly franked with 2ϕ or 3ϕ stamps. This is one of only two covers franked with a 6ϕ stamp, the other is addressed to Italy.



1871-75 Closed Mail - 7¢ Rate

When the direct mail rate to Bremen and Hamburg was reduced to 6ϕ in October 1871, the closed mail rate was also reduced to 7ϕ , giving a new purpose to the 7ϕ stamps and envelopes issued for the former 7ϕ direct mail rate.



The 1867 US-NGU Convention set the maximum registration fees at 10¢ for the US and 2 sgr for Germany. The US actually charge an 8¢ registration fee. This cover is 1¢ convenience overpaid for the 10¢ Closed Mail rate plus 8¢ registry fee.

A CHOICE 1868 AND 1870 GRILLED ISSUE COMBINATION FRANKING PREPAYING THE 18¢ RATE TO GREECE VIA NORTH GERMAN UNION CLOSED MAIL.

In July 1870, the NGU Direct Mail rate was reduced to 15¢ with a corresponding reduction of the 23¢ NGU Closed Mail rate to 18¢. The extra transit charge for letters to Greece was 8¢ for the entire NGU period. Cover to Greece in these years are uncommon as there was little emigration from Greece and no large finds of business or professional correspondence. The recipient Dr. Edward North was a Professor of Greek at Hamilton College, Clinton N.Y. before his appointment as Secretary of the Legation at Athens. This letter was probably sent by a friend there.

Austria-Hungary retained GAPU rates after the 1866 war, Prussia was leading the effort for a new General Postal Union.

There were published rates to India and the Far East using NGU mail, but other routes were used far more frequently, so there are few covers to India extant showing NGU transit.

A SPECTACULAR 1869 AND BANK NOTE MIXED-ISSUE USE DEMONSTRATING THE COMPLEXITIES OF FOREIGN-MAIL RATES DURING THE 1869-70 PERIOD.

The 1870 US-UK agreement allowed partial payment of 4¢ on mail to or through England, but the New York foreign mail clerk rejected the prepayment. This letter would normally have gone in British Mail via Marseilles, but in November 1870 overland routes through France were closed due to the Franco-Prussian War. The British Post Office sent it via Ostende (Belgium) and Coeln (Germany) through the Brenner Pass to Brindisi, then to Alexandria, Egypt by Italian or British packet. It went to India on a steamship of the British Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Co.

India did not apply the correct surcharge for this route, instead applying the old 8a-8p due marking for mail via Marseilles route (30ϕ less 4ϕ because of the "Paid Only to England" marking). The Via Brindisi route was in use for less than nine months.

Benjamin Smith Lyman was a mining engineer for the Department of Public Works in India.

Italy

The rates for foreign mail sent via the NGU included the base direct rate and closed mail rates plus transit fees. The US credited the NGU with the transit fee portion of the rate, which was 4ϕ for Italy. This cover was for prepaid 14ϕ direct rate with a 4ϕ credit, but was mailed prior to the NGU-Italian Convention effective on April 1, 1869, so it was partially paid with 25 centesimi postage due (about 1ϕ).



Cover was sent over the Brenner Pass via Brindisi, an Italian port with weekly packet service to Alexandria, Egypt. The red "10" is the credit to the NGU, and the red "Wf 4" is a restatement of the transit fee of 4 sgr (10ϕ) .

Transit via the United States

Under the US-NGU Convention, the US charged a transit fee of 7¢ for mail to Germany from Cuba.

Under the US-NGU Convention, the US charged a transit fee of 7¢ for mail to Germany from Cuba.

Cuba stamps were not recognized since it did not become a member of the U.P.U. until May 1, 1877.

This cover is important because it shows postage due in the 1875 single German currency (1 Mark = 100 pfennings). Since it arrived after the General Postal Union became effective on July 1, 1875, the U.S. transit fee was crossed out. Postage due was 50 pf. Direct Mail rate plus 30 pf US Transit = 80 pfennings (8 sgr in old currency).







An additional article effective December 1, 1873 provided for a 2¢ rate for postal cards but limited the exchange to direct mail by Bremen or Hamburg.

Printed Matter

Unlike the case with letter postage, rates for printed matter became higher and more complex under the US-NGU Convention. Base rates for newspapers up to 4 oz. were 30 by direct mail and 4¢ by closed mail. Circulars were considered "book-packets" up to 4 oz. and were charged 6¢ by direct mail and 8¢ by closed. That lasted until late 1870, when a special "book-packet" up to 1 oz. rate was introduced for circulars and charged 2¢ for direct mail and 3¢ for closed.

International Forwarded Mail

"21/2" sgr due rating, German (7.30) arrival backstamp; small cover tear and wear, F.-V.F. and interesting forwarded use.

This cover was prepaid 30¢ under the 1857 US-France Convention at two-times 15¢ per 7½ grams. Forwarded under the 1858 France-Prussia Convention at 2¹/₂ sgr. per 10 grams, so letter weighed between 7¹/₂ and 10 grams.

Slow mid-19th century communications meant letters to intermediate destinations often arrived after the traveler had departed. Forwarders, banks and hotels sent them on to the next country as if they had originated there.

Companies specializing in forwarding mail usually had accounts with their clients and often affixed stamps on forwarded mail to take advantage of lower rate for paid letters. Munroe & Co. affixed a 40c French stamp to pay the rate under the 1861 France-Thurn & Taxis Convention.

UPU Mail

The United States and Germany entered the General Postal Union (GPU/UPU) as a founding members on July 1, 1875. Rates from the United States were 5e per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce for letters, 2e for circulars and 2e for postal cards.
